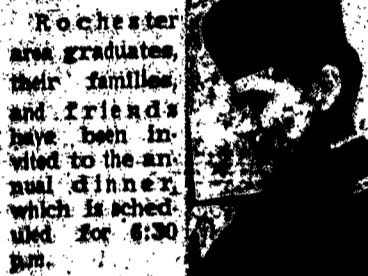

The Rev. Theodore M. Hesburgh, C.S.C., president of the University of Notre Dame, will be the guest of honor and chief speaker April 28 at Hotel Seneca when the Notre Dame Club of Rochester joins other alumni groups throughout the country in celebrating Universal Notre Dame Night.



Kochester area graduates, their families and friends have been invited to the annual dinner which is scheduled for 6:30 p.m. Notre Dame has a campus of 1,700 acres and a faculty of 641 Fr. Hesburgh scholars, and a student body of more than 8,000 young men from every state in the Union and 30 foreign countries.

FATHER HESBURGH became Notre Dame president five years ago at the age of 35, succeeding the Rev. John J. Cavanaugh, C.S.C., in whose administration he had been executive vice-president.

Prior to that he was prefect of religion and chaplain to married veterans and their families. He also served as chairman of the faculty board in control of athletics.

State High School Athletic Association To Be Formed

Plans are in the making to organize a state wide athletic association to expand sports programs and physical education courses in New York's 207 Catholic high schools, the Rev. William Roche reported this week.

Father Roche, assistant superintendent of Rochester diocesan schools, attended an Albany meeting of Catholic high school officials of New York's seven dioceses. With him were the Rev. Cyril Carter, C.S.B. of Aquinas Institute, and the Rev. Robert Boyle, S.J., of McQuaid Jesuit High School.

All three priests stated that no definite details of inter-scholastic competition were discussed at the meeting.

MEETING PURPOSE of the meeting, Father Roche said, was to set up a permanent association at Albany to work with officials

of the State Department of Education in developing health standards, physical education courses, and athletic activities in Catholic high schools.

Heading the organizational meeting at Albany was Rev. John F. Bourke, schools superintendent of that diocese.

Participating in the meeting were also Rev. Matthew Peters of New York archdiocese, Brother Adelbert George, F.S.C., of Brooklyn diocese; Rev. Frank Sammons, Syracuse; Rev. Donald Hughes and Rev. Richard Barry, S.J., Buffalo, and Rev. Floyd Brown, of Ogdensburg.

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
