Father Cleary Tells Group Of George Junior Republic

Corning—The Rev. Thomas K. Cleary, former assistant pastor at St. Patrick Church in this city and now Catholic chaplain at George Junior Republic, spoke of his work among children at the weekly meeting of the Corning Woman's Club in the Baron Steuben Hotel last week. Some 100 women of the area attended.

Father Cleary gave the history of the George Junior Republic from its founding in 1891 until the present time.

The speaker explained that the Republic, which is a town in itself for teenagers from 12 through 21, is non-sectarian. The Republic, he said, is well over 800 acres and houses 125 teenagers. It features a new approach in education, he explained in that besides teaching all academic subjects, it teaches responsibility.

It is self governing, has a constitution and a sound economic system.

All those attending, even though they are paid for attending school on a point system and for the work they do on the farm, in the carpentry shop, the printing shop, various types of mechanics and a maintenance program, have to pay a high tuition in order to attend.

He explained that one third of the population come from homes where parents have requested their child be registered, one third from agencies and one third from court recommendations.

Father Cleary strongly recommended that there be many more Republics established for young people.
