Bishop Casey To Open Henrietta-Rush Campaign For \$125,000 To Build School

His Excellency Auxiliary Bishop Casey will give the principal address at a school fund campaign kickoff dinner for 300 men of Good Shepherd Church, Henrietta, and St. Joseph Church, Rush, at 6 p.m. Saturday, April 6, in the Doulton Post Home, Buffalo Road.

The Rev. George C. Vogt, pastor of both churches, will present Bishop Casey, who will keynote a parishwide solicitation slated Sunday for a minimum of \$125,000 in three-year pledges toward erection of a parochial school first in the Henrietta-Rush area.

Guests will include the Rt. Rev. Msgr. Thomas F. Connors, pastor of Blessed Sacrament Church and founder of both Blessed Sacrament and Good Shepherd Churches; the Rev. Victor J. Hurley, chaplain of St. Ann Home and former pastor of Good Shepherd Church; the Rev. Albert H. Schnuck, pastor of St. Catherine Church, Mendon; the Rev. William J. Schifferl, chaplain at the State Agricultural and Industrial School, Industry; the Rev. Michael P. O'Brien, assistant pastor of St. Monica Church, and the Rev. Edward J. SVD, of St. Michael Mission House, Conesus.

FASHIONERS of both the Henrietta and Rush churches were asked to remain at home Sunday between 1:30 and 3:30 p.m. until contacted by a campaign solicitor. The committee men will make their calls immediately following Benediction at 1:30 p.m. in Good Shepherd Church.

In a message to parishioners, Father Vogt stressed need for the proposed school by pointing out the growing area population and the fact that there now are 360 Catholic pupils in public schools who are receiving part-time religious instruction from the parish. He also noted that all taxpayers of the area will directly benefit from the opening of the school, to be constructed on East Henrietta Road behind Good Shepherd Church.

The eight-classroom building is scheduled for completion by September, 1958. Depending on the outcome of the fund drive there also is planned an auditorium-cafeteria. Currently there are eight Sunday Masses in the parish - five at Good Shepherd, two at St. Joseph's and one at St. Blaise Chapel of Rush.

Classes For Retarded

Genesee Settlement, Health Bureau Share Training Plan

Miss Mary F. Hannick, director, announced this week that the Genesee Settlement House, 10 Dake St., and the Rochester Health Bureau are cooperating experimentally in a program of inter-agency sharing to aid in training retarded young adults.

This pilot program, using City Health Bureau personnel in providing this type of opportunity for the retarded, is unprecedented in New York State.

TRAINING WILL be in food handling methods.

Personnel from the Health Education Office and the Sanitation Division of the Health Bureau have been assigned by Dr. Wendell R. Ames, health officer.

The course is experimental but high standards will be maintained, according to Dr. Ames. In addition, he said, the teaching materials developed will be generally useful in the future.

This Work Adjustment Program is largely financed by the local chapter of the Association for the Help of Retarded Children with monies derived from an annual fund drive.

CLASSES BEGAN last Monday at the Health Bureau and are under the supervision of Joseph Di Santis of the Food Section of the Sanitation Division, Health Bureau.

A course of study includes a bibliography of materials, films and a work book written especially for use with the retarded, is being compiled jointly by Mrs. William F. Foster, Public Health Educator of the Health Bureau, and Mrs. Carl Chamberlain, Director of Programs for the Retarded at the Genesee Settlement House. Mrs. Grant Haist will provide illustrations for the book.

Mrs. Karl Schmidt, supervising leader of the Work Adjustment Program for retarded young adults will participate in the following teaching of the Food Handlers Course.
