

75th Anniversary Marked By Coming KC Council

Corning — The 75th anniversary of the founding of the Knights of Columbus was observed by the Corning KC Council last Sunday morning with a Communion breakfast at the Baron-Stauben Hotel, at which time the Rev. William Jamison, C.S.S.R., of Rochester, as guest speaker, declared that the "world needs the enthusiasm of Christ."

Father Jamison has been on the staff of the Notre Dame Retreat House at Rochester for 34 years. He previously had served for 18 years as a missionary among the lepers and the deaf in Santo Domingo and Puerto Rico. He was introduced by Charles W. Houston, grand knight who also introduced Leo Johnson of Rochester, president of the Diocesan Laymen's Retreat League; William M. Cassidy, Corning area chairman of the league; Francis O'Rourke, Bath-Hammondsport area chairman; Paul Tammaro, past district deputy of the Knights of Columbus; F. Dudley McLaughlin, district deputy of Corning Council; Edward Darangelo, breakfast chairman, and the Rev. Ralph Thomas, S.A., of St. John Atonement Seminary, Montour Falls.

Prior to the breakfast, more than 200 men received Communion at Immaculate Heart of Mary Church in Painted Post.

CALLING FOR enthusiasm, which he described as a quality of the soul, Father Jamison said, "It is much like a sabre which can cut through all opposition. It is the difference between excellence and mediocrity."

He asserted that without enthusiasm, the greatest mind is wasted.

St. Bonaventure Approves Seal For Centennial

St. Bonaventure, N. Y. — St. Bonaventure University has approved of a centennial seal to be used during the University's year-long observance of its 100th Anniversary which will begin next October 4th.

The centennial seal incorporates in two distinct circles the old and the new of St. Bonaventure University.

Both circles are framed by a parland of which birches, recalling the two rows of birch trees which years ago lined the drive of the main entrance to the school grounds.

Additional emphasis on the old is symbolized by the Statue of the Blessed Mother in the left circle. This statue, which once adorned the facade of the campus-church—destroyed by fire—today marks the site on campus of the original buildings of the University.

THE NEW IS symbolized in the right circle by the University Library where the treasures of learning are guarded.

The centennial year theme also is incorporated in the new insignia by the legend, "In Sanctitate et Doctrina." This motto means "In Holiness and Learning." Its origin can be traced well into the 750 year history of the Franciscan Order St. Bonaventure, one of the greatest theologians of the 15th Century and patron of the University, used the phrase, "In Scientia et Sanctitate," which approaches the above in meaning.

Notre Dame Students Design Prize Home

Indianapolis, Ind. — (NC) — Two 21-year-old Notre Dame architecture students won a \$1,000 first prize in the 1957 national design competition sponsored by the Indianapolis Home Show.

They are Noel David of Toledo, Ohio, and Blank Billmeyer, of Wisconsin Rapids, Wis. Their design of a single-story ranch house was judged the best of 225 entries submitted by professional architects and architecture students throughout the country.

The home designed by the two students will be built and will be featured at next year's Indianapolis Home Show.

'Vanishing Fathers'

Milwaukee, Wis. — (RNS) — The "vanishing role of the father" was deplored here by the Rev. F. M. Grovin of Port Credit, Ont. He spoke at the annual convention of the National Catholic Conference on Family Life.

Addressing a workshop session on the responsibility of parents as educators of the preschool child, he declared that absence of paternal authority has caused the "unfeminine trends of girls and the feminine attitudes of boys."

"The girl who is deprived of the father's authority and affection," he said, "is deprived of her first real love for a man that could serve as the pattern for the genuine affection of future years. Without a father's love, she will evade the mother's influence and seek comfort in compensatory romances."
