Sister Severina died April 8, 1957 at the Convent in Pittsford. Solemn Mass of Requiem was offered by Monsignor Edward K. Ball, V. F. assisted by the Rev. Lawrence E. Ward, deacon and the Rev. Edward E. Steinkirchner, subdeacon. The Rev. Albert H. Schnacky was master of ceremonies.

Current problems in the light of Catholic principles were discussed by 90 public high school students at Assumption School of Religion, Fairport in the annual Spring Forum conducted in the Confraternity of Christian Doctrine program.

Sixty students were from the Fairport area and 30 from Ithaca. The Ithaca group was accompanied by nine lay catechists.

Papers were read by individual students on topics such as "Christian Social Behavior" and then discussed by the students in the forum.

The Rev. William M. Roche, associate diocesan superintendent of schools awarded prizes for excellence in the discussion to Kathy Brophy, Ithaca High School Class of 1958 and Al Beato, Fairport High School Class of 1959.

Three classrooms were opened to form one large hall for the Forum and at the conclusion the sliding partitions were drawn leaving the fourth classroom where Benediction of the Most Blessed Sacrament was given by Rev. Leonard A. Kelly, pastor of the Assumption of Our Lady Church, Fairport.

"Student Forums are helpful to stimulate interest and provide an incentive for learning," said Father Kelly. "Forums present the opportunity for the students to encourage each other. They stimulate interest in the high school classes, and make for the more articulate pupils. By means students are led to express their thoughts and convictions and to analyze them in the light of Catholic principles. In this way, they learn to recognize and combat false philosophies which militate against faith in God and right living. The problems for discussion are those which challenge our Catholic students in the world and secular schools of today. Group thought and group expressions are invaluable. One thought suggests another to someone else and by this exchange of views, the ideas take root and grow," continued Father Kelly.

Students will participate in a Student Government Workshop Sunday afternoon, April 14 at the college. Sponsored by the Student Council, the program will begin with a general session at 1:30 p.m. Sister Rose Angela, Dean of Nazareth, will open the workshop.

A GENERAL SESSION at 3:15 p.m. will be addressed by Miss Keaveney on the question: Does Student Government help fulfill the aims of the college? Miss Candida Pilla, Undergraduate president-elect will speak on the Meaning and Nature of Student Government Authority and Miss Eleanor Tyndall will present for discussion The Value of a Demerit System. These three topics will then be discussed in smaller discussion groups, led by students.

After supper the discussion will continue.

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GOD LOVE YOU!

Many readers of Scripture are puzzled by the fact that before Cain had killed Abel, and therefore sinned, God looked favorably on the gifts Abel offered Him and not the gifts that Cain offered. Why? The difference was not in their personalities or character, but in their gifts. Cain offered fruits; Abel offered an animal.

Herein was the difference. Since the fall every man is a sinner and needs redemption. Abel acknowledged his sinful state by pouring out the blood of an animal as a substitute for himself. The shedding of the blood of the animal by Abel implied his sin state and the need of redemption by the blood of Christ. The offering of fruits by Cain involved no admission of guilt. In this he was very wrong and therefore no need of redemption. Cain forgot even the earth was cursed; he came to God with some of his crop, acknowledging God's existence, soliciting Divine favor, but not acknowledging himself as a sinner. There is no mention of Cain's offering being the best of its kind, as was Abel's. He was making no sacrifice!

Apply this to all the appeals you hear and receive to 'give' to this or that institution or cause. Contrast that with the Holy Father's Society for the Propagation of the Faith. Inasmuch as this Society is Pontifical and belongs to the Vicar of Christ, we must all him in Christ's way. Hence our pleas are built on sacrifice: not on giving first fruits of your profits, but on admitting you need redemption because you are a sinner. In other words, if you help the Holy Father help 135,000 missionaries you do so not just because they are needy, but because you are! Make a sacrifice for your sins not in Cain's way but in Abel's way and Abel's way was the prefiguration of Calvary.
