Gymnasium Need Bishop Casey To Bless For Seminarians Babies In Cathedral Rite Stressed For CDA

Geneva—Need for a gymnasium was stressed at the showing here of a control film of the training of young seminarians at Immaculate Heart of Mary Seminary, Lockland Road. The seminary is conducted by the Capuchin Fathers.

The film was shown to members of Court Annunciation, Catholic Daughters of America in Geneva, Women's Club by Father Philip and Brother Francis of the seminary. Father Philip emphasized the gymnasium need. Students of the seminary are of High School age. They receive their four years of training on that level. During this time they participate in sports and follow the example of St. Francis of Assisi founder of the Order, they work and help in the general upkeep of the seminary.

AFTER GRADUATION, the students spend a year at the Lady of the Angels in Virginia as novitates. This year is spent in prayer and reflection. From here the students go to St. Lawrence Monastery in Beacon, N. Y. for seven years. They have three years of philosophy and four years of theology, after which they are ordained priests of the Capuchin Order.

After the film, Father Philip answered questions and invited members to visit the Seminary especially the chapel, and view the paintings of Father Achilles. A benefit is being held by the CDA for the proposed gymnasium and returns are being made by members with Mrs. Mary Hall at Gilbert's Jewelry Store on Exchange St.

Monsignor Bela Varga Due May 8

The first hand story of the Hungarians' fight for freedom will be told by Monsignor Bela Varga, the victim of Nazi and Communist persecutions at Our Lady of Mercy High School auditorium, 1000 E. 10th St., May 8. It was announced today.

The noted Hungarian prelate will be brought here by Rochester Diocesan Council of Catholic Women of which Mrs. Theodore Strohmeyer is president. The lecture will begin at 8:30.

Monsignor Varga was speaker at the last five Lenten lectures here. During his activity in his native country he was arrested with 90,000 Polish refugees in Hungary.

Monsignor Varga is president of the Hungarian National Council, New York City. He returned from a nine-week tour of Europe in October of last year.

Vigils, Midnight Masses To Usher In Easter

All churches of the Diocese of Rochester will climax observance of Lent with impressive Easter Vigil rites scheduled for late this Holy Saturday night.

Mass at midnight in honor of the Resurrection of Our Lord will conclude the Easter Vigil ceremonies.

Striking feature of the Easter Vigil will be renewal of baptismal vows by congregations in candle lighted churches.

Holy Saturday ceremonies, previous to last year were observed in most parishes on Saturday morning. As last year, Holy Saturday rites will be held this Saturday in the evening beginning at 10:30 or 11 p. m. as scheduled by individual pastors.

Congregations will be urged to sing the responses and other chants of the Vigil service and Mass in accord with the recently revised directions for Holy Week ceremonies.

THE HOUR LONG rites preceding the midnight Mass will include blessing of the new fire and Easter candle, symbols of Christ rising from the dead. Votive will be blessed for use at baptism and the litany of the saints will be chanted.

All ceremonies are to be conducted in such a way that the people will see and understand them.

Many pastors have arranged to have a priest in the pulpit to explain the rites while other priests conduct the ceremony in the sanctuary.

Holy Saturday will be marked as a day of fast and abstinence until midnight. Those bound to fast may eat meat once on that day. Those not pledged to fast may eat meat more than once.

There will be no church services on Holy Saturday morning.

Confessions will be heard Saturday afternoon and evening in preparation for Easter Communion.

Catholics desiring to receive Holy Communion at the Easter Vigil Mass are required to fast three hours from solids and one hour from liquids.

Good Friday is being observed today by many business firms closing for the day, others shutting down from noon to three p. m. to allow employees to take part in religious services. This practice was encouraged by the Fourth Degree Assembly of Rochester Council, Knights of Columbus.

41 New Cases Reported By Auburn Family Center
