

DCCW Inter-Deanery Workshop To Join With Diocesan Unit Spring Conference

Officers and members of the Cayuga and Tompkins Tiooga Deanery Councils of Catholic Women will be hostesses to officers and chairmen of the Rochester Diocesan Council who will participate in the area workshop, the first Spring Conference of 1937, in Auburn, on Sunday April 25.

Setting for the Conference will be the Catholic Daughters Home on Auburn's South Street. Mrs. Veronica Smith and Mrs. John Chazy, presidents respectively of the Cayuga and Tompkins Tiooga Councils, are in charge of arrangements.

The Conference will begin at 2:30 P.M. and will close at 5:30 P.M., and will be followed by a buffet.

PURPOSE OF the Conference will be to acquaint more Catholic women with the structure of the National (Council of Catholic Women), which is a federation of Catholic women's organizations in 47 of the United States, Hawaii, and of American Catholic women associated with the American military installations in Germany, a total membership of some 3,000,000 Catholic women.

Its committee system encourages interest in religious education, family and parent education, home and school associations, youth, immigration, inter-American and international relations, social action, relief at home and abroad.

The Rev. E. Leo McLannus, moderator of the Diocesan Council, emphasized the importance of "constant repetition" by Catholic women leaders of the wide-scope

Mt. Morris Student In Atom Research

St. Bonaventure, N.Y. - Vincent D. Genco, 6 Erie St., Mt. Morris, a freshman physics major at St. Bonaventure University, is a student assistant in a research program involving the study of atoms from outer space.

The program, "Operation Sky Hook," had its origin on the island of Guam where a balloon carrying photographic films was jotted 26 miles into the stratosphere from the deck of an aircraft carrier.

The attached films recorded the tracks of heavy atoms entering the earth's atmosphere. Where the films are developed, they developed and shipped to the universities participating in the project for examination under a microscope with special attachments.

From this study, it is hoped to learn the energy of these incoming particles, what kind of atoms they actually are, and if the number of atoms in outer space is in the same ratio as those same atoms on earth.

Dr. Blackwelder who received his doctorate from Stanford University is the author of five books and eighty-four publications in the field of Biology.

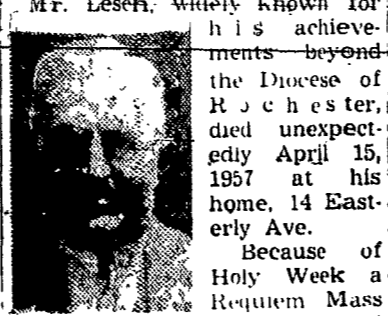
Alhambra To Greet New Sir Nobles

His Excellency Bishop Kearney will address the 500 volunteer workers of the Cenacle Building Fund campaign, Wednesday, April 22. Bishop Kearney, who is Honorary Chairman of the Drive, also will preside at the session which will be held at 8 p.m. in McQuigan Jesuit High School Auditorium, 1800 Clinton Avenue South. This meeting will mark the final phase in the drive to raise \$250,000 to be used to construct a new 3-story addition to the Cenacle Retreat House on East Avenue.

Also scheduled to address the workers, division leaders and captains are the Reverend James R. Barrett, S.J., and Francis McCole, prominent layman, who will outline the campaign program and instruct the workers in the use of the pledge cards.
