Bath - The Rev. Dennis Kulmatycky arrived here last week to assume the duties as parish priest to the congregation of Christ the King Ukrainian Catholic Church.

Father Kulmatycky comes directly from St. Peter and St. Paul Church in Ludlow, Mass., where he served for eight years.
He was appointed to the local parish by the Most Rev. Ambrose Scieszkyan, Bishop of Stamford, Conn., whose diocese extends throughout the New England States and New York.
Plans are being made for the Bishop to visit the Bath church the middle of May. Fr. Kulmatycky said yesterday.
Fr. Dennis was born in Western Ukraine in 1889 and came to the United States in 1913. He is a graduate of St. Mary's Seminary in Baltimore, Md., and was ordained in Philadelphia in 1916.
On his arrival in Bath, the new priest became busy in helping his parishioners, about 30 families, prepare for the Easter tide.

CBS Bans Priest's Talk
Washington (NC) - The National Council of Catholic Men has urged a revision of policy by the Columbia Broadcasting System following the CBS Radio discussion refusal to broadcast Father Davis' address, a radio talk by Father Thurston N. Davis, S.J., editor-in-chief of America magazine.
In a letter sent to Arthur H. Hayes, president of the CBS Radio Division, Martin H. Work, NCCM executive director, said the CBS refusal to broadcast Father Davis' address "has served to bring into focus a difference of opinion that should be resolved."
Father Davis' address was prepared for the CBS Church of the Air radio program on March 10. The subject of the talk was Protestant Catholic tensions. After it was denied "clearance" by CBS radio it was published in the March 16 issue of America under the title "A Time for Silence, or a Time to Speak."
