Funeral services were held Tuesday, May 7 for Sister M. Mildred Goode of the Sisters of St. Joseph in the motherhouse chapel, Pittsford.

Sister Mildred, former administrator and superior at St. Mary's Boys' Home, Rochester, died May 4, 1957 in St. Joseph's Hospital, Elmira.

CELEBRANT OF THE funeral Mass was Monsignor Gerald C. Lambert, with Monsignor Arthur F. Florack as deacon, and the Rev. Eugene H. McFarland, sub-deacon.

A native of Boston, Sister Mildred entered the Sisters of St. Joseph in Rochester in 1906. She taught at the old Cathedral and Immaculate Conception Schools until assigned to the boys' home in 1911, where she became superior in 1929.

When St. Mary's Boys Home was razed in 1942, Sister Mildred was transferred to St. Joseph's Hospital. She was in charge of the housekeeping department there until her retirement two years ago because of ill health.
