

2000 Expected At K.C. State Convention

Two thousand visiting delegates and members will be welcomed to Rochester and entertained at the 62nd annual convention of New York State Knights of Columbus to be held, May 23, 24 and 25 by Rochester Council, according to General Chairman John J. Finney, past grand knight.

The convention will be formally opened with Solemn High Mass, presided over by His Excellency Bishop Kearney, former state chaplain who will also speak in St. Joseph Church, Rochester, Friday, May 24 at 9 a.m. The Mass will be celebrated by the Rev. James R. Barnett, S.J., rector of McQuaid Jesuit High School and Rochester Council chaplain.

THE MASS will be preceded by a parade of state officers, delegates, visiting and local knights from Hotel Seneca, convention headquarters to the church. A group picture will be taken in the church courtyard after the Mass.

The opening and welcoming session will be held in Hotel Seneca ballroom at 11:30 a.m. after the Mass. Election of state officers is scheduled for Saturday, May 25.

Registration of state officers, delegates and visitors on Thursday, May 23 will begin at 2 p.m. on the hotel mezzanine floor. That evening in Columbus Civic Center will be an open house, termed the "K. Bar C. Ranch" decorated in the Western atmosphere. Natali, former state warden as chairman will begin at 9 p.m. in the ballroom. Business sessions on Friday will begin at 2 p.m. in the ballroom.

VISITING LADIES will be entertained by Rochester's Ladies Auxiliary at a luncheon and entertainment in the Columbus Civic Center at 12:30 p.m. Friday and on Saturday by a trip to Eastman House, Dryden Theater leaving Hotel Seneca at 1 p.m.

Convention sessions, including the election on Saturday will be held in Columbus Civic Center ballroom beginning at 9 a.m. The annual state dinner is scheduled at 7 p.m. Saturday, May 25 in the Sheraton Hotel. State Deputy Frank D. J. Flanagan will welcome guests, present the newly elected state deputy and present Charles A. Tucker, former chancellor of Rochester Council in the main address. Benediction by Bishop Kearney will close the convention.
