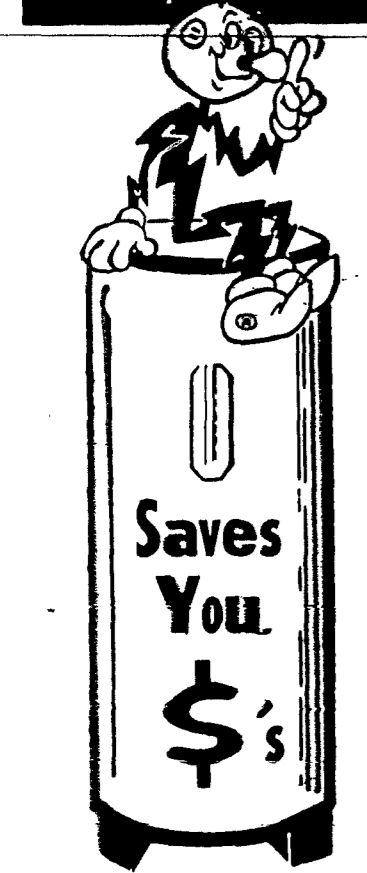

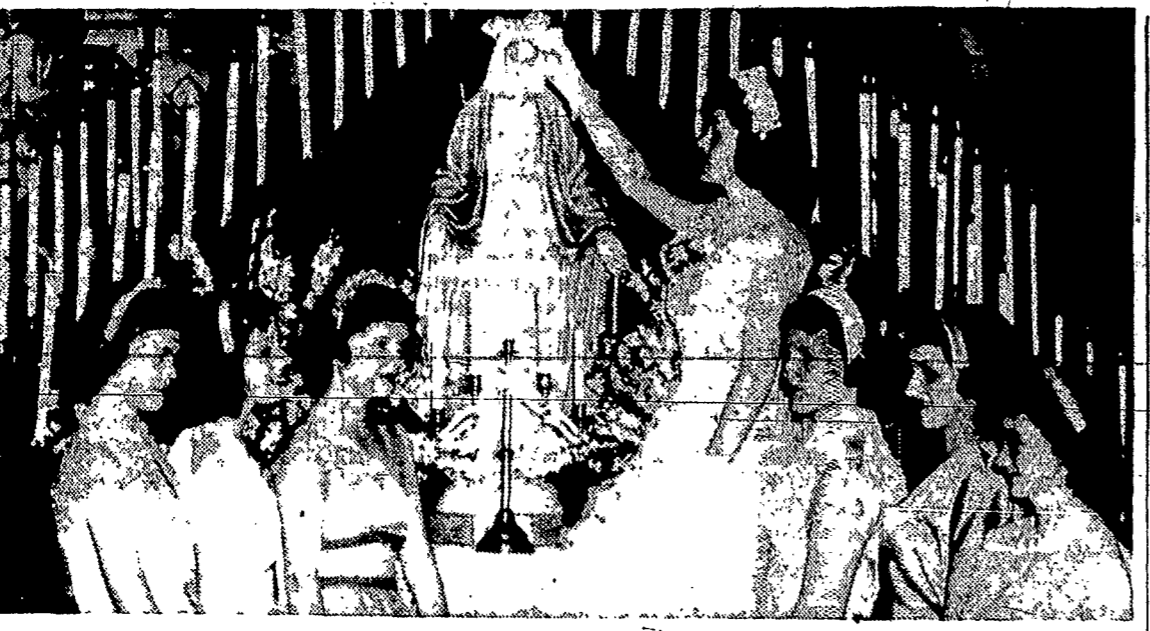

### Bishop Senyshyn Breaks Ground For New Elmira Heights Church

More than 500 persons attended ceremonies in Elmira Heights Sunday, May 19, marking the blessing and breaking of ground on which a new St. Nicholas Ukrainian Catholic Church will be erected.

Due to inclement weather, part of the program was held in the church after an outdoor blessing ceremony at McCann's Blvd. and McCauley Ave.

Presiding was His Excellency, Bishop Ambrose Senyshyn, OSBM, apostolic exarch of the Stamford Exarchy, Stamford, Conn.

The Ukrainian greeting was extended by Mary Dowytsky, who presented Bishop Senyshyn with a bouquet of flowers.

A solemn procession escorted the exarch into the church. Led by the cross bearer and the altar boys, the procession formed in the church hall. The altar boys were followed by the veterans of the Feshoh-Macekur Catholic War Veterans Post and the Auxiliary, who formed the color guard.

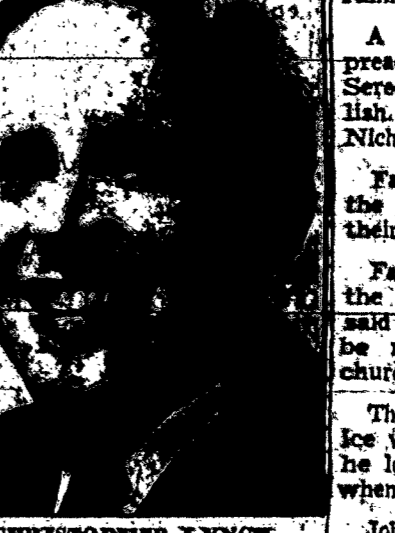
Proceeds will be used for the Council's charities fund, which assists with church projects, supplies baskets for the needy at Thanksgiving, and is available for other community causes.
