Mercy Pageant Acclaimed

More than a century of history revolving about Rochester's Sisters of Mercy came to vivid life in the "Magnificat of Mercy," a pageant of song, ballet and dramatic sketches staged at Mercy High Auditorium Sunday through Wednesday evenings of this week.

The opening event in the centennial observance of the establishment of the Sisters of Mercy in Rochester in June of 1857, the pageant will be followed by solemn religious ceremonies at Old St. Mary's Church on June 15.

A CAST OF 360, including speech-choir, ballet and glee club groups from Mercy High, and grammar schoolers from parochial schools where the Sisters of Mercy teach, told the panoramic story of the Mercy Sisters origin in Dublin in 1831 through their arrival in Rochester a century ago and on to the present day.

Students of Mercy High School played dominant roles in the production but the large cast included young men from St. John Fisher College, Aquinas Institute, McQuaid Jesuit High, Brockport State Teachers and Rochester's Catholic Theatre group.

Sister Mary Peter, R.S.M. and Sister Mary Fels, R.S.M., members of the Mercy High faculty, were codirectors.

Lavishly produced with lighting, costuming and musical support which would do justice to theater professionals, the pageant featured ballet interludes with choreography by Miss Gloria Kolb of Nazareth College and Miss Bernadette Mason of Mercy High. Michele Farrell, Mercy freshman, and Mercy Junior Mary Kay Principe and Martha Kramarczuk were outstanding soloists.

GENE COTTER and Vern Saunders were soloists with the 100-voice Mercy Glee Club directed by Sister Mary Margaret, R.S.M. Cotter in two Civil War songs and Saunders in a special medley of American melodies won warm applause.

Forty lads of the Boys' Choir of St. Thomas School vested in red cassocks and white surplices appeared in the stirring opening.
