### Dinner For 500 To Open Holy Angels Home Drive

More than 500 men and women who will seek funds next week for a building addition to Holy Angels Home, 1326 Winton Rd. N., will attend a kickoff dinner at 6:30 p.m. Monday, June 10, in Cotuit Bus Civic Centre.

Pledges will be sought throughout the county toward construction of a monastery and classroom addition to the institution, where education and training are provided teenage girls in need of special guidance. It will be the first public appeal for funds by the 13 Holy Angels Nuns at the home, who have maintained themselves and their work there for the last 27 years. They have been unable however to save anything toward the capital expenditure represented by necessary additional building to ease overcrowded facilities.

**SOLICITATION** of one year pledges is scheduled from June 10 through June 20. Committees also have been formed among friends of the home in several towns of the county.

Guests at Monday's kickoff will include the Rt. Rev. Msgr. Arthur E. Rattigan, director of diocesan Catholic Charities, the Rt. Rev. Msgr. John M. Duffy, pastor of St. Augustine Church, the Rt. Rev. Msgr. Charles V. Boyle, superintendent of diocesan schools, the Rt. Rev. Msgr. Francis B. Burns of St. Bernard Seminary faculty, the Very Rev. John F. Murphy, C.S.B., president of St. John Fisher College, the Very Rev. James R. Barnett, S.J., rector of McQuaid Jesuit High School, the Rev. Francis M. Feeney, pastor of St. James Church, Irondequoit, and the Hon. Joseph G. Fritsch, judge of Monroe County Children's Court.

**MOTHER IMMACULATE** Conception, superior of the home, has obtained permission of His Excellency Bishop Kearney to address the committee following the dinner. There are currently 84 girls ranging in age from 9 to 16 at Holy Angels "home away from home." The Sisters provide both grammar and high school commercial classes. The home is registered with the State Department of Social Welfare and has been receiving disturbed and neglected youngsters irrespective of race or color of creed from Monroe County and from counties in Western and Central New York. The Sisters operate the home on a cottage plan system which postulates small units of "mother-daughter" relationship and every effort to approximate family life. Average stay of the girls is one to four years. The nuns often assist in the after-care and employment search of the girls. Statistics show that more than 85 per cent of the girls are rehabilitated and take their place in society as good Christian women.

Laboratory program, in this seventh year of operation.

The answer to "How Can We Help Johnny Read?" is found in the aids given poor readers in the center at Holy Family School, 87 North St., Auburn, an announcement from that school said. The student who suffers from lack of reading ability will be given the privilege to find his own way to read through the many helps which will be given to him at the school.

Eight experienced instructors and two psychometrists guide the program at the Laboratory. No machines are used; it is a rapid reading level stressed. Remedial reading is needed, the announcement said, by normal learners with a disability in reading; those who read fairly well but are slowed up by a problem speech or personality; bright children not working to capacity.

Registration deadline for the reading classes at St. Mary School, Corning, closed on May 31. Sister Mary Helen of the Junior College faculty was registrar. The past two summer classes at the Corning school had pupils enrolled from Corning, Gibson, Campbell, Addison and Honby.

**CLASSES ARE** made up of five or six pupils having the same reading disability; they extend for a period of one hour, from Monday through Saturday. Speech correction work is a part of the program and

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
