

Philippine Bishop, Year's Report Of \$18,523 Heard At Aquinas' Rally

Bishop Teopisto Alberto of Sorogon, Philippines appealed to 1,100 Aquinas Institute students "for more laborers in the vineyard of Christ" at the closing Mission assembly of the school year.

A total of \$18,523.26 of mission offerings for the year was reported for the students by the Rev. John M. Wilson, C.S.B., moderator of Aquinas Mission activity. Father Wilson said that Aquinas has consistently been the national leader in mission activities through the years.

Bishop Alberto reminded the students that one priest in the Philippines must often care for more than 30,000 persons.

BEING 80 PERCENT Catholic, the Bishop said, the Philippines can claim the title that is often given it, "The Christian nation of the East." Hence, they do not have the tremendous problem of setting out to Christianize a whole country, the problem in the Philippines is rather to get the Catholics to live up fully to their responsibilities as members of the Church.

Bishop Alberto was introduced by Rev. George S. Wood, diocesan director of the Society for the Propagation of the Faith and a graduate of Aquinas Institute, who commended the boys on their outstanding Mission spirit.

LEADING HOMEROOM for offerings was Father Peter J. Ellinger's senior room with a total of \$1688.05. Gerry Abel was student leader. In the junior division first place honors went to Father John L. Kraus, sophomore room, assisted by Roy Scalera, with a total of \$861.93.

In second place in the junior division was the freshman room of Sister Hildegard with a total of \$503.43. Student leader was Sam Mannano. In second place in the senior division was Father Edmund E. Burn's room, Francis Lipani, student leader, with a total of \$1355.97.

Father Wood presented the Paladín award, the highest student award of the Catholic Students Mission Crusade, to Jerry Mathies. The second highest award, St. Louis the Crusader, was presented to Roy Miller.

The class of 1953, represented by Larry Oberlies, presented a check for \$25 to the highest homeroom. The offering was collected at a recent class reunion. Father Wood took up the challenge of Oberlies and presented \$75 as a contribution of the class of 1952.

The Mission assembly was concluded by offerings being made to Bishop Alberto, Father Fuller on behalf of the Mexican Missions, Father Eugene Sheg, an Oblate Missionary and graduate of Aquinas and to Father Wood.
