Seventy-five of the 129 graduates in the Aquinas Institute 1932 class assembled at Hotel Sheraton, Saturday, June 8 for the Silver Jubilee reunion. Most of the graduates brought their wives.

A \$75 donation was made for the Aquinas Mission Fund. A poem recalling activities in high school days, written by Paul Marchese and sent from Detroit was read. During the program it was brought out that seven priests and 12 doctors are members of the class. One member, James Bleden is stationed in the American Embassy in Cardiff, Wales.

Hon. Thomas J. Meagher, former state Youth Director and Monroe County Children's Court Judge, a member of the class, spoke for his fellow members. Nel Shaw of Avon was cited as the outstanding father of the class, having 12 children.
