At that time he moved with his family to Somerville and attended St. Clement's School and High School. He enlisted in the Air Force and served in England during World War II. After returning from overseas he entered the seminary and was graduated this year from the Seminary of the Holy Angels at Niagara University.
He was ordained in the Church of the Shrine of Our Lady of La Salette in Ipswich, Mass.

Mother Immaculate Conception, superior of the 13 Holy Angels Nuns at the home, 1326 Wilton Rd. N., was a principal speaker at the general kickoff dinner. She detailed the work at the Home, which provides education and character formation for teenage girls in need of guidance.

FRIENDS of the home in Monroe County are being solicited to fund toward construction of an addition to the school building to include a monastery, four additional classrooms, a recreation room for the girls and quarters for a chaplain.

Mother Immaculate explained that the home is maintained on a year-to-year basis but that the nuns have been unable to save monies for capital expenditures such as new construction. She said that the home facilities have been overcrowded for several years.

More than 600 workers in Rochester and in towns of the county are seeking donations or one-year pledges to the home. Daniel E. Macken, chairman of the advanced gifts committee, reported that the average of pledges reported by his committee has been very good. He appealed to the committee to complete their calls this weekend and report next Tuesday night.
