Bishop Tells Knights 'Century Of Layman'

Hamilton — (NC) — The 20th century will go down in Church history as the century of the layman, Bishop William J. Smith, of Pembroke and state Chaplain of the Knights of Columbus, said here.

Bishop Smith spoke at the Pontifical Mass, highlighting the K. of C. state convention. "The Church today, as perhaps never before in her long and glorious history needs laymen to assist her in the work of serving and of saving souls," Bishop Smith said.

"The ordinary layman in his daily duties comes into most intimate contact with the world around him and has an opportunity of preaching Christ and echoing His powerful message of salvation, such as seldom comes to the clergy."

Bishop Smith said that Catholic interest "demands the existence of powerful organizations of the laity which will devote themselves with all earnestness and courage, to the promotion and defense of those sacred interests wherever and whenever they are unjustly attacked by forces opposed to the Church's teachings."
