#### POAU Head Asks President's Veto

Washington, D. C. - (RNS) Dr. Glenn L. Archer, executive director of Protestants and Other Americans United for Separation of Church and State, saked President Eisenhower to veto legislation passed by Congress to permit two Congressmen to receive and wear papal decoration. He said the legislation would make the Roman Catholle Church a "for-

eign State" in Asmerican law. In a telegram to the President, Dr. Archer said the measure to allow Reps. John C. Mc-Cormack (D. Mass.) and John the Order of St. Gregory the Great was passed by both Houses of Congress within 24 hours of its introduction without any study of its famplications by a committée.

Protestants and Other Americans United for Separation of Church and State had asserted in an editorial in the June issue of "Church and State Newsletter" that the two congressmen might have violated the constitution by accepting the papal decoration.

Both the House and Senate passed the resolution without debate and without referring it to committee. They then passed, in the same way, another resolution authorizing Rep. McCormack and Rep. Joseph W. Martin, Jr., (R.-Mass.) to receive and wear a decoration of the Philippine Legion of Honor in the degree of

THE RESOLUTIONS were then sent to President Eisenhower for signature.

The measure on the papal decorations authorizes and directs the State department to deliver to Reps. McCormack and Rooney "any decorations and documents accompanying the award." To comply with the constitutional technicality, the Congressmen had deposited their decorations with the State Department pending Congressional approval.

The resolution also declares that notwithstanding paragraph 604 of chapter 22 of the U.S. Code. "The name recipients may wear and display the aforementioned decorations after acceptance thereof."

A SPOKESMAN for the Bureau of Information of the National Catholic Welfare Conference here said the St. Gregory the Great decoration, so far as records of the Apostolic delegation show, has never before been awarded to a member of Conress. However, former Senator Joseph E. Ransdell (R.-La.) recelved it in 1938, seven years after his retirement.

# Red Tito Chains Church Freedom Skips Persecution

New York - (NC) - Religion in Yugoslavia i ree — up to a point — according to Marshal Tito.

In a filmed interview-the 65-year-old head of state told a nation wide television audience that the Orthodox and Moslem faiths, as well as Certain areas" of the Catholic Church, are free.

Speaking from his villa on the Adriatic island of Brioni. President Jossip Broz - more ramous as Marshall Tio. leader of the anti- nazi guerrillas during World Wat II—qualified his freedom of religion statement thus:

"I should only like to stress the really good relations be tween the state and the Orthodox church between the state and the Moslem church, and then partially in certain areas . . . between the state and the Roman Catholic Church

CBS reporter Edward R. Murrow had questioned the co murist leader on the status of religion in Yugoslavia, Marshall Tito's answer was: "It is free."
