

Carmelites List Novena At Henrietta Monastery

The 27th Annual Novena of the Discaled Carmelite Sisters in honor of Our Lady of Mt. Carmel will be held in their new monastery on West Jefferson Road, Henrietta beginning Sunday, July 7.

The Sisters observed their first year in the Henrietta Monastery on Saturday.

Devotions will be held in the chapel at Mass each day at 8 a.m. On Sunday afternoon at 4 p.m. Benediction of the Most Blessed Sacrament will be imparted.

PERSONS attending the novena may get a partial indulgence of seven years and seven quarantines, each time they are present. A Plenary Indulgence may be obtained for attending five services and the usual conditions of Confession and Holy Communion within eight days of the Feast.

Any unable to attend may mail their petitions to the Monastery, West Jefferson Road, Pittsford RD 2. Petitions will be placed at the feet of the statue of Our Lady within the cloister.

The Novena will solemnly be closed with High Mass and sermon on Tuesday, July 16, the Feast of Our Lady of Mt. Carmel.

The Solemn Mass will be celebrated by Monsignor Wilfred Craugh P.A., assisted by the Rev. Leo C. Mooney, deacon and Monsignor John S. Rasmussen, Sub-deacon. Monsignor Richard K. Burns will preach. Mass will be provided by Our Lady of Mercy High School girls.

'Backyard Missionaries' Girls' Bazaar Aids Mission In India

The American State Department may not be aware of it but two Rochester school girls have launched their own "backyard" program in a Catholic Mission in South India.

The missionary-minded youngsters, both teenagers, and their cousins, are Susan Cudzilo of St. Stanislaus School and Patricia Cudzilo of St. Andrew's School.

RECENTLY the girls sent a total of nine dollars in aid of the mission. It is also a lot of money for an Indian missionary, more in fact, than he receives from his poor people in four months.

The Rochester girls raised their mission donation by conducting a backyard bazaar at the home of Patricia's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Henry Cudzilo, 1504 Norton Street.

In preparation for their fund-raising venture, the school girls spent several weeks making vases out of orange juice jars and baskets out of colored paper.

THE YOUNG foreign mission-aid promoters were given a helping hand in the venture by their school friends, Marilyn Roosen and Gail Legner of St. Andrew's School, Emily Cwalina, Christine and Paula Cudzilo of St. Stanislaus School, and Patty Kowalchuk of St. Joseph's School.

How did the youngsters find out about Father Michael in far off India? Through Susan's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Edmund Cudzilo of 730 Norton Street. Susan's parents read about Father Michael in a mission magazine and started writing to him.

When Susan and her cousin Patricia heard about the hardships of the Indian missionary, they decided to help too.

A recent donation sent to him by Patricia's parents was turned over to a Protestant doctor, who, the missionary explains, "has served my dispensary free for the past four years. God bless him. He managed to get some medicine with the money."

Meanwhile Susan and Patricia have some plans for their "backyard" missionary apostolate. First, they want to do something to help the Carmelites and then the Trappists.

So, little girls have made the backyard down Norton Street way very important to the world's "forgotten men"—the foreign missionaries.

Appointment of three Rochester area Basilian priests to the faculty of Aquinas Institute is announced this week by the Very Rev. George B. Flaherty, C.S.B., superior general.

Included in the Basilian appointments was the transfer of Father W. Oscar Regan, C.S.B., assistant superior at Aquinas, to Assumption High School, Windsor, Ont., where he will hold the same office.

Father Regan has been a member of the Aquinas faculty for 20 years, coming to Rochester in 1937 when the Basilian Fathers arrived here to staff the boys' high school.

During the 20 years, Father Regan assisted on weekends at many parish churches including Sacred Heart Cathedral, Old St. Mary's and St. Charles Borromeo Church. He was chaplain of Our Lady of the Cenacle Council, Knights of Columbus in Greece at the time of transfer.

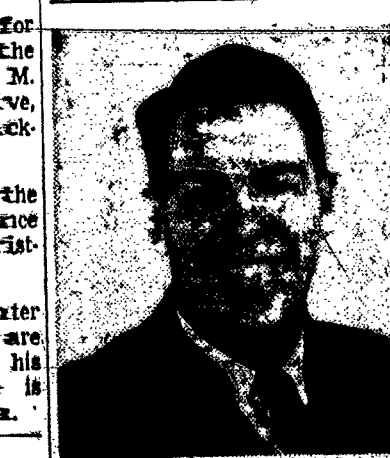
