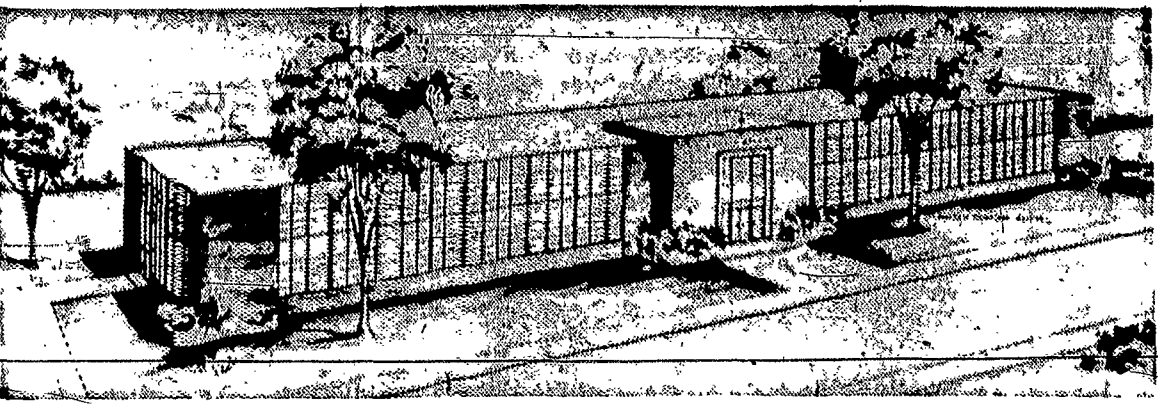

Niagara U. Plans Science Building

ARTIST'S RENDITION of Niagara University's proposed \$1,000,000 Science Building — first step in the university's 10-year \$6,700,000 Development Program. It is shown above. Architectural plans call for the proposed Science Building to be a 58-room two-story brick and steel structure with a floor area of 40,000 square feet. Contemporary and functional in design, the rectangular building will be 60 feet wide and 288 feet long. Units planned include 18 laboratories, eight spandrel classrooms, a large lecture room with amphitheater seating for 156 students and three departmental libraries with space for approximately 12,000 volumes. Edward J. Trautman of Buffalo is the architect. Construction of the on-campus Science Building is planned for 1959.

Japan Appoints Catholic To Manila

Manila (AP) — The Japanese government has appointed a Catholic to the post of ambassador to the Philippines. The appointee is the Rev. Fr. Mariano Garcia, who has become the first Catholic ambassador to the Philippines since 1898.

GOD LOVE YOU!

MAO, THE COMMUNIST Dictator of China has just admitted liquidating 800,000 of his people. This figure is perhaps only a fraction of those whose lives, like unripe wheat, have been unthinkingly cut by the Communist sickle. Mao has said that the Catholics among this number were not persecuted or liquidated because of their religion, but because they were "unpatriotic". The same charge was directed against Our Lord in the court of Pilate: "Thou art not a friend of Caesar." Now the name is Mao instead of Caesar, even the forces of evil know that the Faith is sacred that it should be attacked under another name, just as Judas knowing that Christ was the Son of God, prefaced his betrayal with a sign of affection, the blistering kiss.

THERE ARE TWO POSSIBLE reactions to this liquidation and persecution of the Faith: one, inspired by the newspaper, the other by the life of Christ. If the first, our reaction is to say "Oh, aren't they terrible, those Communists!" If the second, we say, "Oh, how terrible, am I not to feel their pain, their suffering, and their death as my own."

WHILE THESE PEOPLE ARE stripped of life, cannot we like Christ be stripped of a garment for their redemption. During the entire year of 1956 the Catholics of the United States gave only 30 cents apiece to the Holy Father to aid the persecuted and suffering in Asia, Africa and Oceania. This is not sharing either the passion of the Chinese or the Passion of Christ. When Our Lord was stripped of His garments it was to put on the nakedness of our shame, our holding comforts to ourselves and our luxuries.

MY GOD, PEOPLE, WHY not practice self-denial — just a little a day; only a few cents. At the end of the month send it to us and we will send it to the Holy Father.
