### Year-long Centennial Program Planned At St. Bonaventure

St. Bonaventure, N.Y.—The Most Rev. Joseph A. Burke, Bishop of Buffalo; The Very Rev. Celsus Wheeler, OFM, Provincial of Holy Name Province, and F. Ramsay Devereux of Utica, N.Y., will serve as honor- centennial program of St. Bonaventure University, which began on October 4th, the Feast of St. Francis of Assisi.

Bishop Burke is a successor to the Rt. Rev. John Timon, first Bishop of Buffalo, who played one of the key roles in the establishment of St. Bonaventure's College and Seminary a century ago.

It was Bishop Timon and Nicholas Devereux of Utica, great grandfather of Ramsay, who petitioned the Holy See in 1854 for Missionaries for this part of the state. At that time, the best of a university for the area was a dream of Mr. Devereux.

**IMPETUS FOR** the enterprise was given by Mr. Devereux when he subscribed \$5000 in addition to the Most Rev. Venantius of the Franciscan order. At his instance, four frairs volunteered to come to America to establish a new mission in the Buffalo Diocese.

The Rev. Pamphilus Magliano, OFM, headed the founding band which landed in New York in 1855 and settled in Elktonville where the first building for the College and seminary in Allegany was planned.

Bishop Timon laid the cornerstone in August, 1856. The building was completed and dedicated in October, 1858 and placed under the protection of St. Bonaventure, celestial patron of Franciscan studies.

As Minister Provincial of the Franciscan Province of the Most Holy Name and as Chairman of the Board of Trustees of the University, Father Wheeler follows in the footsteps of Father Pamphilus who was the first religious
