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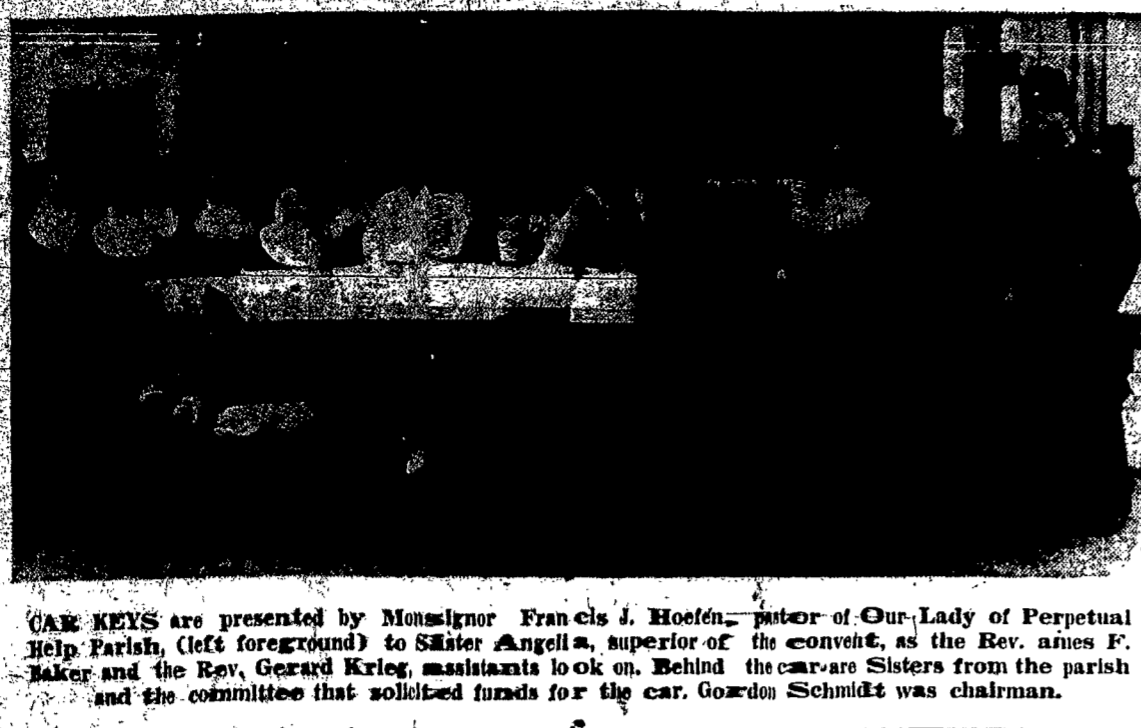

Fr. Gallagher New Chaplain Of Deaf Group

The Rev. John B. Gallagher, C.S.S.R., in charge of the Catholic deaf in Rochester and Buffalo dioceses was named chaplain of the International Catholic Deaf Association in convention at Toronto, Canada, July 21 to 28.

Cardinal McLaughlin offered Mass in St. Michael Cathedral and addressed more than 500 delegates and members at the banquet.

Loss of the Faith and purity of life is real tragedy compared to loss of hearing, the Cardinal said.

"Remember that the greatest handicap is for us to lose our holy Catholic Faith and pure moral life," the Cardinal Archbishop of Toronto told the delegates.

It is not a tragedy to be deaf, the Cardinal said. "A lot of things we hear are not good for our souls," he added. "The deaf do not hear many of the bad things going on in the world."

Augustine J. Cunningham, Papal Knight, Rites Listed

Funeral Mass for Augustine J. Cunningham, prominent layman and Knight of the Holy Sepulchre will be offered Saturday at 10 a.m. in Corpus Christi Church, Saturday, August 3.

Mr. Cunningham, long in the forefront as a Rochester industrialist died in his home, 1000 East Ave. after a short illness on July 31, 1937. He was 79.

ACTIVE IN THE Catholic Charities since its organization in 1917, Mr. Cunningham was vice president at the time of its death. He had held that post since 1945. As a trustee of the Charities organization he missed but a few meetings during his 40 years of association.

A trustee of Corpus Christi Church, he was also one of 10 laymen of Rochester diocese inducted in 1932 into the Equestrian Order of the Holy Sepulchre of Jerusalem on recommendation of the late Bishop John Francis O'Hern. He was a life member of Rochester Council, Knights of Columbus.

Mr. Cunningham was president of James Cunningham and Sons Co., Inc. since 1908. He began work in the family business in 1901 and saw it develop through the years from producing horse-drawn carriages, then automobiles and now aircraft actuators, aircraft gun controls and automatic transmission assemblies.

He was a member of the board of directors of Monroe County Savings Bank, also of the Genesee Valley Club and the Country Club of Rochester.

Mr. Cunningham is survived by a brother, Francis E. Cunningham, vice president and treasurer of the firm; a niece, Mrs. Murat W. Williams of Washington, D. C.; two nephews, Peter F. Cunningham and Michael M. Cunningham; several grandchildren and nephews.

New Lourdes School in Elmira To Share Use with St. Patrick's Now Remodeling

About 440 students of St. Patrick School, Elmira will attend classes on a single session basis this fall at the new Our Lady of Lourdes School in West Elmira. It was announced this week.

The temporary relocation is necessary because of the modernization project at St. Patrick's Building on Park Place, now underway.

ARRANGEMENTS for use of the new school building were made between Monsignor William J. Brien, V.F., pastor of St. Patrick Church and the Rev. Leo G. Schwab, pastor of Our Lady of Lourdes Church.

With 195 pupils enrolled in the new Lourdes school to consist of kindergarten and four grades, the total number of students to be using the building daily will be about 635.

Monsignor Brien said present plans call for his school to be ready for occupancy about Jan. 1.

During the first four months of the new school year half of St. Patrick's students will attend classes in the morning and the other half will attend afternoon sessions.

SISTER M. CECILIA, St. Patrick's principal, said final details of the transfer are being worked out.

However, it is expected that students in grades 5 through 8 will be in class four hours a day while first through fourth grade students will have 3 1/2 hours of instruction daily. This arrangement will fulfill State Board of Regents requirements, Sister Cecilia said.

Room is available at the new Lourdes School. The Donarese Place, Elmira, that parish, is opening the school this fall with only a kindergarten and the first through fourth grades.

While Lourdes students will occupy five rooms, there are six more rooms available for instruction of St. Patrick's pupils.

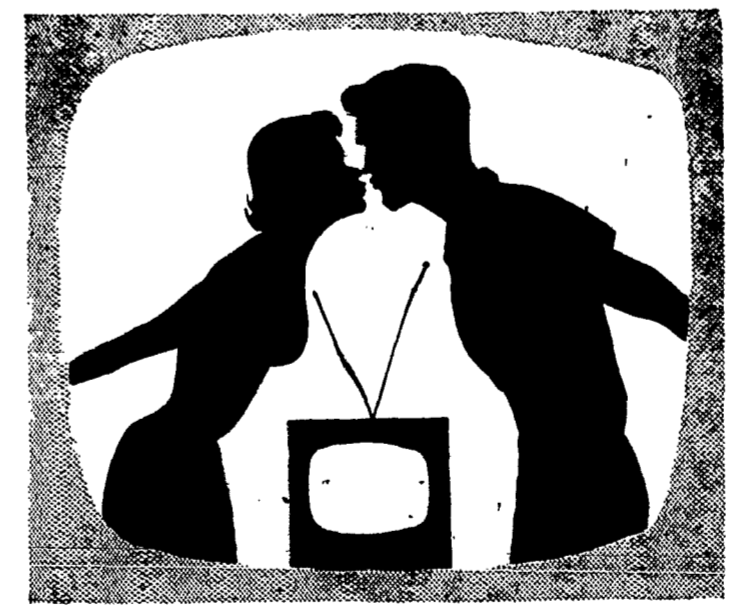
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
