Cardinal Spellman Accepts State Chaplaincy of K. C.

His Eminence Francis Cardinal Spellman, Archbishop of New York, has accepted the State Chaplaincy of the Knights of Columbus, according to Emmett Burke of Yorkville, State Deputy. The order now numbers 108,000 members in the Empire State jurisdiction. There are now 290 Councils from Long Island to Buffalo.

IN REQUESTING the Cardinal to serve, State Deputy Burke pointed out that the K. of C. this year is celebrating its 75th anniversary diamond jubilee and His Eminence the 25th anniversary of his consecration as a Bishop.

Cardinal Spellman has been a member of the K. of C. since his youth joining the order in his native Whitman, Mass.

He entered the Fourth Degree in New York on Oct. 11, 1942 when he founded a class of 300 candidates. This was the 150th anniversary of the discovery of

Convention Lists Cardinal Stritch

More than 5,000 delegates and guests are expected to attend the diamond jubilee convention of the Supreme Council of the Knights of Columbus to be held in Chicago from August 20 to 22. Raymond E. Nary, master of the Fifth District, Fourth Degree Knight of Columbus and John J. Kinney, state chairman of the bowling committee are expected to attend from Rochester.

Announcement of the program was made here at the council's headquarters. His Eminence Samuel Cardinal Stritch, Archbishop of Chicago, will open the convention with a Pontifical Mass. The Cardinal and Supreme Knight Luke E. Hart, of New Haven, will be the principal speakers at a States Dinner.

OTHER SPIRITUAL activities will include a holy hour at St. Peter's church with a sermon to be given by Bishop Charles P. Greco of Alexandria, La., and a novena at the Basilica of Our Lady of Sorrows. The 5,000 delegates will represent more than a million K. of C. members from five countries.

Among social activities will be a concert in Grant Park, open houses at various Chicago councils, a convention ball, a big league ball game and the 28th annual Chicago Music Festival at Soldiers Field.

Msgr. Leo M. Finn of Bridgeport, Conn., K. of C. Supreme Council chaplain, and other officials and delegates will consider new and old business with respect to the numerous projects conducted by the K. of C. The society now has more than \$120 million in assets.

Among K. of C. projects that have been praised by His Holiness Pope Plus XII and the hierarchy of several countries were the micro-filming of manuscripts at the Vatican Library, the Catholic advertising program and the work on behalf of playgrounds in Rome.

Construction of the campaign at the National Shrine of the Immaculate Conception in Washington, D. C., is one of the most recent projects undertaken by the K. of C. at a cost of more than a million dollars. The campaign and the shrine is known as the "Knights Tower" and is scheduled for completion in 1959.

Bishop Casey Confers Diplomas On 24 Nurses

Commencement exercises for 24 graduates of St. Joseph Hospital School of Nursing, were held at St. Peter and Paul Church, Elmira, Sunday, August 4 at 3:30 p.m. About 600 attended the ceremony.

He congratulated the parents and emphasized the sacrifice they had made to make this day possible for their daughters.

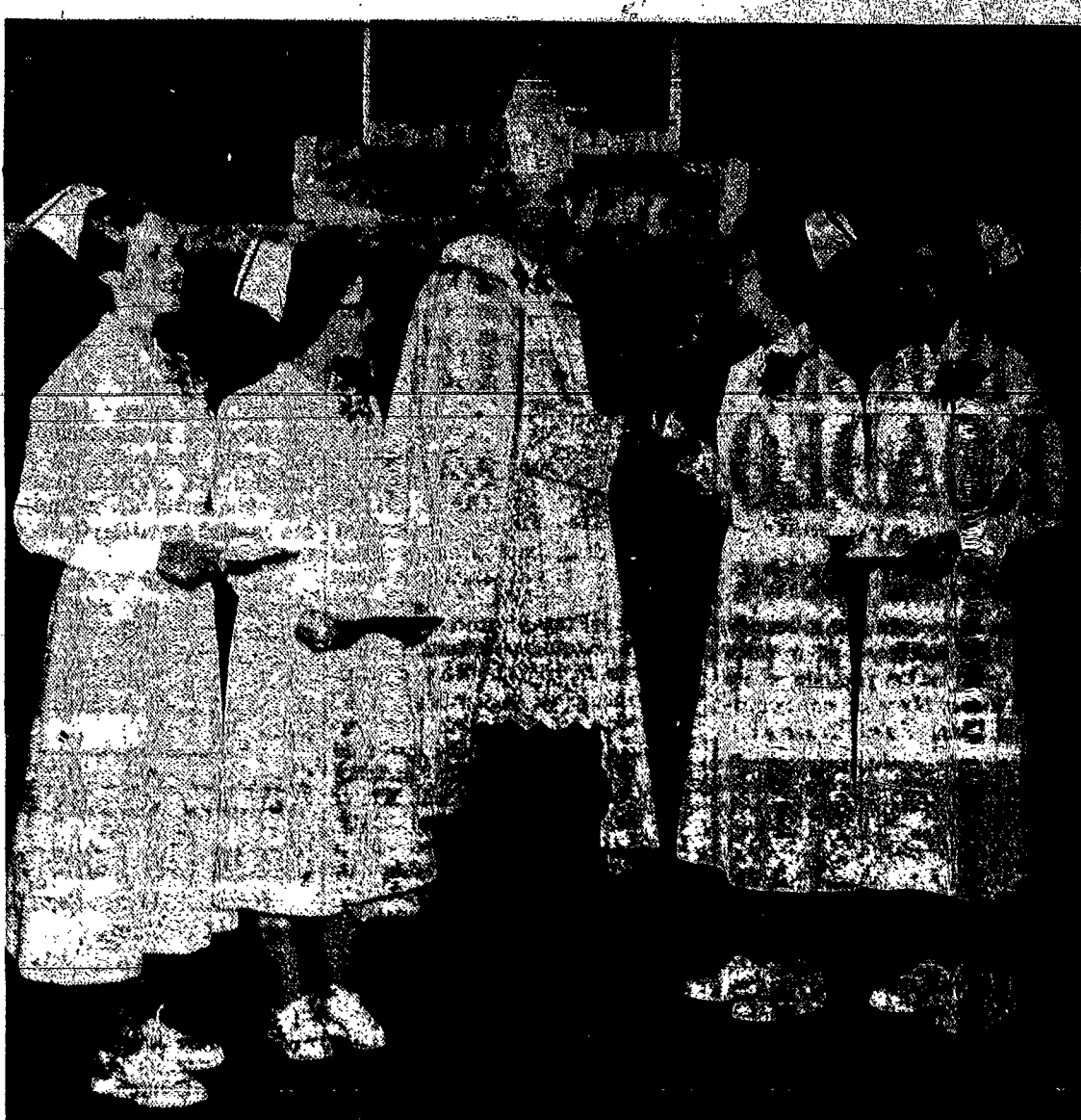
Award for Excellency in Nursing Practice. This award is sponsored by St. Joseph's Hospital Alumnae Association.
