He said the nurses also need humility and prudence, justice and patience "unending; if, truly you are to serve Christ in the person of sick men."

Elmira School To Start Third Year

Five hundred and ten pairs of shoes will cross the threshold of Notre Dame High School, Elmira when the fall term opens in September. When the school opened six years ago, there were 340 students.

Conducted by the Sisters of Mercy, Notre Dame is the only Catholic High School in the Southern Tier of the Rochester Diocese.

In September, the faculty including the Rev. Joseph F. Hogan, chaplain and spiritual director; Sister Mary Raphael, principal; 15 other sisters, three lay teachers and a secretary will be on hand to begin the third year of training for the Catholic boys and girls of the area.

THE GROWING contingents of students from Elmira and surrounding communities of Waverly, Conning Chemung and the three Pennsylvania communities of Saint Albans and Milan bear witness to the fact that parents are anxious to have their children enjoy the benefits of a Catholic education, the faculty said.

Parents have contributed to the success at Notre Dame through the Parents Association, active since the founding of the school in September 1955. They have sponsored a variety of fund raising projects to augment the resources of the school.

Scanning the accomplishments of the graduates over a two year period gives further evidence that Notre Dame has been successful. Four state baccalaureates were conferred by graduates, highlighting its reputation in this field.

AN INCREASING variety of courses is now being offered at Notre Dame including home economics, public speaking and music. Complete courses in business and arts are also being offered.

The athletic program is advancing in basketball and basketball as well as bowling and physical education. Football is still in the offing.
