 Pastor of St. Patrick's Church, Elmira.  
 A HIGH Mass in the Little Flower Chapel of the Nurses' Residence at 9:00 a.m. opened the day's program. The Mass offered by Father McGowan was sung by the student body.  
 The Rev. James F. Slattery, assistant pastor of St. Vincent de Paul Church, Corning in the baccalaureate address at the Mass spoke on the theme of Veronica as meditated upon in the Sixth Station of the Cross.  
 "The secret of success in your own lives as Catholic nurses will be a great personal holiness," Father Slattery said. "You need the faith of Veronica to enable you to see beneath the weak and broken bodies, the blood, yes, and even the dirt of your patient, the living image of God Himself, a member of Christ's Mystical Body."  
 "You need the love of Veronica to enable you to perform many distasteful tasks - to bind up wounds, to soothe a fevered brow, to moisten parched lips, even when that person might be repulsive to you."  
 He said the nurses also need humility and prudence, justice and patience "unending, if truly you are to serve Christ in the person of sick men."  
 A RECEPTION for the graduates, their relatives and friends was given in the Auditorium of the Nurses' Residence, after Commencement. Sisters of St. Joseph's Hospital and the Faculty of the School of Nursing were hostesses at this reception which was arranged by the Social Committee of St. Joseph's Hospital Women's Auxiliary. About 500 attended the reception.  
 In a brief ceremony held in the Nurses' Residence preceding Commencement, "moving up exercises" were held for members of this year's Freshman and Junior classes.

Pretoria, South Africa (NC) - South Africa's Catholics have so far paid more than a half of the \$2,500,000 they have pledged to keep in operation the Catholic mission schools in the area.  
 The fund-raising campaign was started in November, 1955, when the government began cutting off subsidies to privately-operated schools.  
 The Bantu Education Act of 1953 gave private school systems the choice of surrendering their schools to government direction, or continuing without government aid.  
 Of the various school systems in South Africa, the Catholic missions schools alone chose to continue independently.
