John Russer Funeral Rites Conducted At Holy Ghost

Funeral services for John W. Russer, brother of two cloistered nuns and widely known for his work in development of sports among youth Miller's Son Funeral Home and in Holy Ghost Church, Coldwater, Wednesday.

Mr. Russer, 40 of 106 Coldwater Rd., Gates and secretary of Russer's Inc., 257 Adams St., died August 11, 1957 in St. Mary's Hospital.

Solemn Requiem Mass was offered by the Rev. Albert J. Geiger assisted by the Rev. James R. Barnett, S. J., Deacon and the Rev. George C. Vogt, Subdeacon.

Mr. Russer was a member of the Holy Name Society of Holy Ghost Church, a third degree member of Rochester Council, Knights of Columbus and a member and first president of the Bishop McQuaid High School Fathers Club. He belonged to several civic, business and social organizations and was active in Gates Little League.

The wholesale meat firm of which he was secretary was founded by his grandfather, Max in the late 1800s and later operated by his father, also named Max, who died in 1928.

Active in promoting athletic programs for young men, John Russer in 1947 dedicated Russer Memorial Park in memory of his father. The park was in Coldwater Road.

He left Aquinas Institute in 1933 to join his brother, Max O. Russer and their mother, Eleanor Russer, in the meat business.

He is also a third degree member of the Knights of Columbus, St. John Fisher Council, East Rochester and treasurer of the Rochester Personnel and Guidance Association.

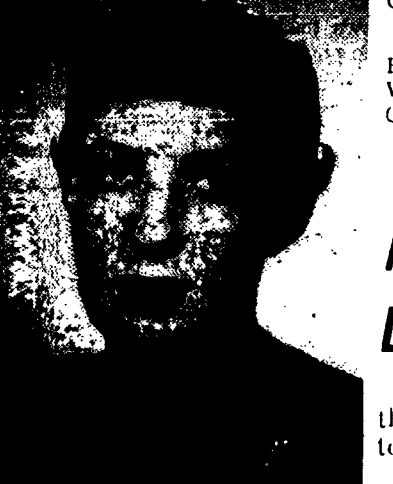
At the college, Tucker is chairman of the Committee on Academic Standing, and the Committee on Scholarships. He also serves as a member of the Committee on Admissions.
