

### WHAT'S NEW In The Parishes

### Monsignor Morrison Dies, St. Bernard Alumnus

Chicago — (NC) — Solemn Requiem Mass for Msgr. Joseph P. Morrison, 63, former rector of Holy Name Cathedral, here, was offered in Immaculate Conception Church in suburban Highland Park.

His Eminence Samuel Cardinal Stritch, Archbishop of Chicago, presided at the Mass offered by Father Philip T. Wild, nephew of Msgr. Morrison. Burial was in All Saints Cemetery.

(Monsignor Morrison, well known to priests of the Rochester Diocese, studied for the priesthood at St. Bernard's Seminary, Rochester. He attended the bi-annual meetings of the seminary alumni association faithfully throughout his nearly forty years in the priesthood.)

Msgr. Morrison died (August 14, 1957) in Lake Forest Hospital. He was born in Chicago and was ordained in 1918. He was named a papal chamberlain in 1934 and a domestic prelate in 1938.

After serving 22 years as rector of the cathedral, he became in 1945 pastor of the Highland Park church, to offer greater leadership in the National Liturgical Conference, of which he was head.

He was founder of Mundelein Cathedral High School, and co-founder of Maryhouse, which cares for destitute women; the Catholic Actors Guild, and the Chicago Catholic Interracial Council.
