Interlaken Parish Distributes Booklet

Interlaken — Establishment of St. Francis Solanus parish here, as a full-fledged church after more than 80 years as a mission and completion of remodeling and decorating of the church are commemorated in a souvenir booklet issued by the parish.

The 6 x 9 booklet entitled "Priests and Pioneers" was published under the direction of the Rev. Gereon Lindsay, O.F.M. Cap., named administrator after His Excellency Bishop Kearney entrusted St. Francis Church to the Capuchin Fathers.

Another Capuchin of St. Fidelis Friary here, the Rev. Julius Sullivan, O.F.M. Cap. provided the research and wrote the booklet.
A PROFILE of Father Gereon and a letter from him to the parishioners occupy an important place in the booklet after pictures of His Excellency Bishop Kearney, His Excellency, Auxiliary Bishop Casey and the remodeled church.

Formerly a mission of St. James Church, Trumansburg, St. Francis Solanus Church was started June 4, 1874 when Bishop McQuaid laid the cornerstone. From then to July of 1956 when Bishop Kearney's letter elevated it to an independent parish, St. Francis was in charge of Trumansburg pastors, all noted either in pictures or written accounts in the book.

Tribute is paid to pioneer Catholics in Interlaken dating back to 1838. Articles recall the early settlers in what was known as "Farmer Village," the devotion of the Catholic settlers and development of the area after the Diocese of Rochester was established in 1868.

Former Capuchin Superior Named National Chaplain
The Rev. Bede Scully, O.F.M. Cap., former superior and founder of the Capuchin Friary at Interlaken, N. Y. was appointed national chaplain of the Catholic War Veterans at their convention in Milwaukee, Wisconsin.

Father Scully is a member of Friar Jerome Kobel Post in New York City and was chaplain of the New York State C.W.V. He served in the United States Navy in the Pacific area from 1943 to 1946.

Father Scully was the first superior of the Capuchin friary at Interlaken. He was succeeded by Fr. Gereon Lindsay, O.F.M. Cap., the present superior in 1955. Since then Fr. Scully has been resident chaplain at the Wassate State School for the Retarded at Wassate, N. Y.

WHILE SUPERIOR at Interlaken, Father Scully worked in close cooperation with Fr. Leonard A. Kelly, now pastor of Assumption Parish Fairport, then pastor of St. James Parish in Trumansburg and St. Francis Solanus Parish in Interlaken. Father Kelly has since become chaplain of the Monroe County Chapter of the C.W.V.

Father Scully was born in 1907 at Yonkers. He became a Capuchin in 1924 and was ordained a priest in 1931. He came to Interlaken as superior of the

The book records the celebration of St. Francis Parish's 75th anniversary of the cornerstone laying on Nov. 6, 1949 when Bishop Kearney celebrated Mass. The pastor of St. James, the Rev. Leonard A. Kelly supervised the celebration and saw to it that many improvements were installed in the church. The present pastor, the Rev. Francis A. Marks took care of the spiritual needs of Interlaken parishioners for two years.

An account of the Franciscan Capuchins and their entry into the Diocese of Rochester and later taking over St. Francis Solanus Church rounds out the book.

He also served as professor at St. Lawrence College in seminaries in Milwaukee, Wisconsin, and at other institutions of his order.

School Head Recommends New Civics Club Theme

A comparison of freedom with communism—the theme to be studied in the coming year by boys and girls in Catholic Civic Clubs of America—was commended for its value this week by Rt. Rev. Msgr. Charles V. Boyle, diocesan superintendent of schools, in a letter sent to parochial-school principals of the diocese.

IN HIS LETTER, Monsignor Boyle called this year's theme "Your Freedom Under God" a timely and important subject especially since this year marks the 20th anniversary of Pope Pius XI's historic encyclical on Communism, *Divini Redemptoris*.

The Catholic Civic Clubs of America are sponsored by the Commission on American Citizenship of The Catholic University of America to encourage boys and girls of the upper elementary grades of parochial schools all over the United States to participate in community projects and to learn more about their government.

MONSIGNOR BOYLE also noted the availability of study aids in the form of regular articles in the Young Catholic Messenger, the current affairs weekly by that name as an intermediary between the commission and the clubs in developing the theme.

A preprint enclosed with Monsignor Boyle's letter outlines the theme for the coming year.
"During the coming year you and thousands of other Civic Club members are going to find out how important to your daily life are the God-given freedoms you enjoy. You will see what a loss of those freedoms has meant to the citizens of other lands. You will work in your own community against the inroads of materialism.

"Your freedom under God is a precious thing. You must learn to use it wisely, to guard it jealously."
SPECIAL FEATURES planned for the Civic Club study series will include articles emphasizing individual dignity, family, religion, government, education, communication, and police power.

Included in the preprint enclosed with Monsignor Boyle's letter was a play to be used for a possible Civic Club program "The Citizen: He's a VIP."
Monsignor Boyle closed his letter with a recommendation that every school participate in this year's project.

Faithful Friar of Rochester Council, Fourth Degree Assembly of the Knights of Columbus, Monsignor Cuffney will be presented by the Rev. E. Leo Mannus, also of St. Bernard's and newly named K. of C. Chaplain and club moderator.

Any Catholic man receiving Holy Communion on the First Friday is eligible to attend the luncheon, Attnasi said.
Monsignor Cuffney is a former chaplain of the 55th district, Knights of Columbus and has served as assistant pastor in St. Patrick Church, Seneca Falls and St. Mary, Canandaigua.
