## Nazareth College To Share In Firm \$5000 Grant

Nazareth College of Rochester is among the 23 private colleges in the Empire State Foundation of Independent Liberal Arts Colleges which will share in the \$5000 grant made by Procter and Gamble to this foundation.

This is the first time that Procter and Gamble is including the state and regional associations in its program of aid to education.

Other member colleges of the Empire State Foundation are: Alfred University, Bard College, Barnard College, Colgate University, D'Youville College, Elmira College, Hamilton, Hartwick, Hobart, Houghton, Keuka, Manhattanville College of the Sacred Heart, New Rochelle, Russell Sage, St. Lawrence, Saint Rose, State University of New York, Union, Vassar, Wagner, and Wells.

Procter & Gamble aid to education program will involve the planned expenditure of close to one million dollars a year.

Included in the present program are undergraduate scholarships to 240 young men and women in 52 colleges and universities, post-graduate fellowships, contributions to such funds as National Fund for Medical Education, United Negro College Fund, and unrestricted gifts of \$20,000 each to ten large universities.

## Testing, Guidance Center Opening Slated By Nuns

The Testing and Guidance center of the Reading Laboratory conducted by the Sisters of Mercy will hold registration for the fall session Sept. 17 and 18 from nine to five o'clock at Our Lady of Mercy High School.

Registration must be made by a parent, according to Sister Mary de Pazzi, Dean of Catherine McAuley Junior College and Coordinator of these services. Students from all schools of all ages from second grade on are eligible for either testing services or remedial reading.

**READING CLASSES** are conducted throughout the week and on Saturday mornings; the maximum registration in a class is seven members, in order to keep instruction on a tutorial basis.

Students are given complete diagnostic testing to ensure accurate grouping according to instructional needs. A student may elect a one-hour class each week or more; two- or three-hour reading disabilities are severe.

The latest equipment and materials are available in the Reading Laboratory.

Testing services include testing in intelligence, personality, subject-matter achievement, vo-

itional aptitude, interest inventories, aptitude for music and art training. All testing is done by individual appointment for either individual test or a complete battery.

# Catholic Information Series To Reopen At Downtown Hotel

The Faculty of St. Andrew's Seminary will renew, this fall, its Catholic Information Forum, a series of six lectures designed to acquaint non-Catholics with the basic teachings of the Catholic Church and to enable Catholics to learn more about their faith.

The meetings of the Forum will be held each Monday evening from September 23 through Oct. 28 at the Seneca Hotel, except for the last one which will be a visit to a Catholic church or chapel. The Director is Rev. Raymond M. Kenny (C.S.S.R. 8-1975).

**FIRST MEETING** of the series will be held on Sept. 23. Rev. Louis J. Hohman will deliver a lecture entitled, "God Loves You," in which he will show how God answers in Revelation man's deeply rooted hunger and thirst for God. The final, perfect word in God's answer is Christ and Christianity.

On Sept. 30 the apparent dilemma "Church or Bible?" will be resolved by the Rev. Richard M. Quinn, he will speak on the nature of the Scriptures, the need for a teaching Church, and the relationship of the two.

On Oct. 7 the Rev. T. Paul Murley will speak on an "Encounter with Christ." The story of man's creation and fall will be linked to his redemption by Christ and the application of that redemption through the sacraments.

"The Golden Rule" will be explained by the Rev. Albert J. Shamon. He will discuss the Moral Law as Christ's Way and show how Christ brought that Law to its perfection. Special emphasis will be given to the virtues of Charity and Purity.

On Oct. 21 the Rev. Paul J. Gibbons will speak on "The One Mediator." He will discuss the central position that Christ and the Mass hold in a Catholic's life. Catholic worship and devotions will be explained, including the veneration of the Blessed Virgin Mary and the saints.

**THE FINAL** meeting of the

Catholic Information Forum will be held on Oct. 28 and will consist in a visit to a Catholic church or chapel. The furnishings of the church and altar, stations of the cross, Mass vest-

ments, sacred vessels, liturgical books, and Christian symbolism will be shown and explained. A question period will follow each of the lectures. The entire series is open to the public.

## Redemptorist Marks Silver Jubilee In Home Church

A Redemptorist Father who left old St. Joseph Orphan Asylum as a boy to enter the Congregation of the Most Holy Redeemer returned to St. Joseph Church, Rochester, Sunday, Sept. 8 to celebrate his Silver Jubilee as a priest.

The Rev. Charles S. Morawski, C.S.S.R., celebrated a Solemn High Mass of Thanksgiving assisted by the Rev. John J. Crowell, C.S.S.R., as deacon; the Rev. Francis Donlon, C.S.S.R., subdeacon and the Rev. Edgar Gaffey, C.S.S.R., as master of ceremonies.

Father Morawski's 25 fruitful years as Redemptorist priest, missionary and World War 2 chaplain were reviewed by the Very Rev. Gerald J. Whelan, C.S.S.R., rector of St. Joseph's.

**BORN IN** Rochester in 1903, Father Morawski, spent his early life and school days with the School Sisters of Notre Dame at St. Joseph Orphan Asylum. He was graduated in 1919 from St. Joseph Grammar School then in existence.

Entering St. Mary's Preparatory School at North East, Pa., he completed the course and had one year of novitiate at Richester, Md. He completed his studies for the priesthood at Mount St. Alphonsus, Redemptorist Seminary at Exopus, N.Y. and was ordained on June 19, 1923.

During World War 2, Father Morawski spent four and a half years as an Army Chaplain. He completed a wide tour of duty in Southern France with the 81st Station Hospital caring for prisoners of war, mostly priests and ministers. He began his Army service in Florida and North Carolina in this country, went to Casablanca, and was 18 months in North Africa. He later served with the 7th Army in Southern France, and was released from service in December, 1945.

**AFTER ORDINATION** the young priest served at Holy Redeemer Church, in New York City; St. Boniface, Philadelphia; St. Mary's, Buffalo, and entered the army as chaplain in June 1942.

After he was returned to St. Joseph's after the war he returned to St. Mary's Buffalo, then to the Mission Church in Boston and St. Philomena, Pittsburgh. In 1950 he was assigned to the Veterans Administration Hospital in Koughtan, Hampton Va. The last seven years he has worked in missions in the South and is now acting pastor of St. Jude Church, Franklin Va.
