VOCATIONS IN THE UNITED STATES have not reached a crisis, but the situation is serious. One of the reasons for the decline, we believe, is that there is not a sufficient emphasis on sacrifice in our American Catholic life. The Cross is revered more than it is carried. It is sometimes borne nobly when imposed but it is not sought for a principle of life: "Take up your cross daily and follow Me."

VOCATIONS DO NOT COME from magazine appeals, tracts, vocational posters showing tennis courts for novices, they come from fellowship with the Crucified Christ in families and in the lives of the young. Pictures of beautiful novices and Hollywood type young men will not win souls for God as well as will the image of Christ Crucified first seen, then endured, then embraced.

NOW TURN TO AFRICA. Every Bishop has the same story to tell us. "We had to turn down fifty vocations last year because we could not afford to take them" and again, "Last year we rejected one hundred twenty." As the Holy Father said in his encyclical on Africa the responsibility is on us. These thousands of young people fail to reach the altar. They are anxious to take up the Cross; they are ready to sacrifice all that they have, their very lives, for the love of God and souls. Learn the joy of sacrifice from those who seek the Cross and imitate them by daily denying your self a little luxury. By assuming the Cross of doing without luxuries you will be adding vocations at home by increasing the spirit of sacrifice in your life.

## St. John Fisher College Opening Slated; 190 New Students To Report On Sept. 16

St. John Fisher College, under the direction of the Basillan Fathers, will open for the 1957-1958 academic year on Monday, Sept. 16.

All new students will report on Monday, Sept. 16. Sophomore students will register on Tuesday, Sept. 17. Junior and Senior students will register on Wednesday, Sept. 18. Lectures begin for all students on Friday, Sept. 20.

New students reporting Monday, Sept. 16 will be met by their Senior Counsellor who will guide them through the registration procedure. This system of student, senior counsellors has been used successfully at the college for several years. The senior counsellor provides a friendly introduction to all phases of college life, curricular and extra-curricular, for the new student during his first semester.

NEW STUDENTS will participate in a testing program Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday, Sept. 17, 18 and 19. On Thursday morning, in Assembly they will listen to the President, Very Rev. John F. Murphy, C.S.B., Ph.D.; the Dean, Rev. John F. O'Meara, C.S.B., Ph.D.; the Registrar, Mr. Gerard H. Tucker, M.S., and the President of the Student Board of Governors, Guy T. Filato, '58.

Former students will meet in Assembly on Friday, Sept. 20. All students are looking forward to the activities of Freshman Week, Sept. 23-27. The week's activities

are climaxed by Freshman Day on Friday, Sept. 27. On this day His Excellency Bishop Kearney, will say the Mass of the Holy Ghost. The annual freshman frolic will take place on the afternoon and the Annual Freshman Dance in the College Auditorium in the evening.

A REGISTRATION of four hundred and forty-five full-time students is expected at St. John Fisher College this fall. Seniors will number 55; Juniors, 83; Sophomores, 117; new students about 190.

The College offers courses leading to the degree of Bachelor of Arts, Bachelor of Science, Bachelor of Business Administration as well as Pre-Medical, Pre-Law and Pre-Engineering Professional courses. It is also possible for students interested in education to take their teacher training and cadet teaching in the education program.

AFTER A BRIEF welcome from Sister Rose Angela, Dean, on Monday morning, the Freshmen will participate in the first session of the testing program. A social hour with the faculty is scheduled in the afternoon, with a marshmallow roast and songfest at LeFay in the evening.

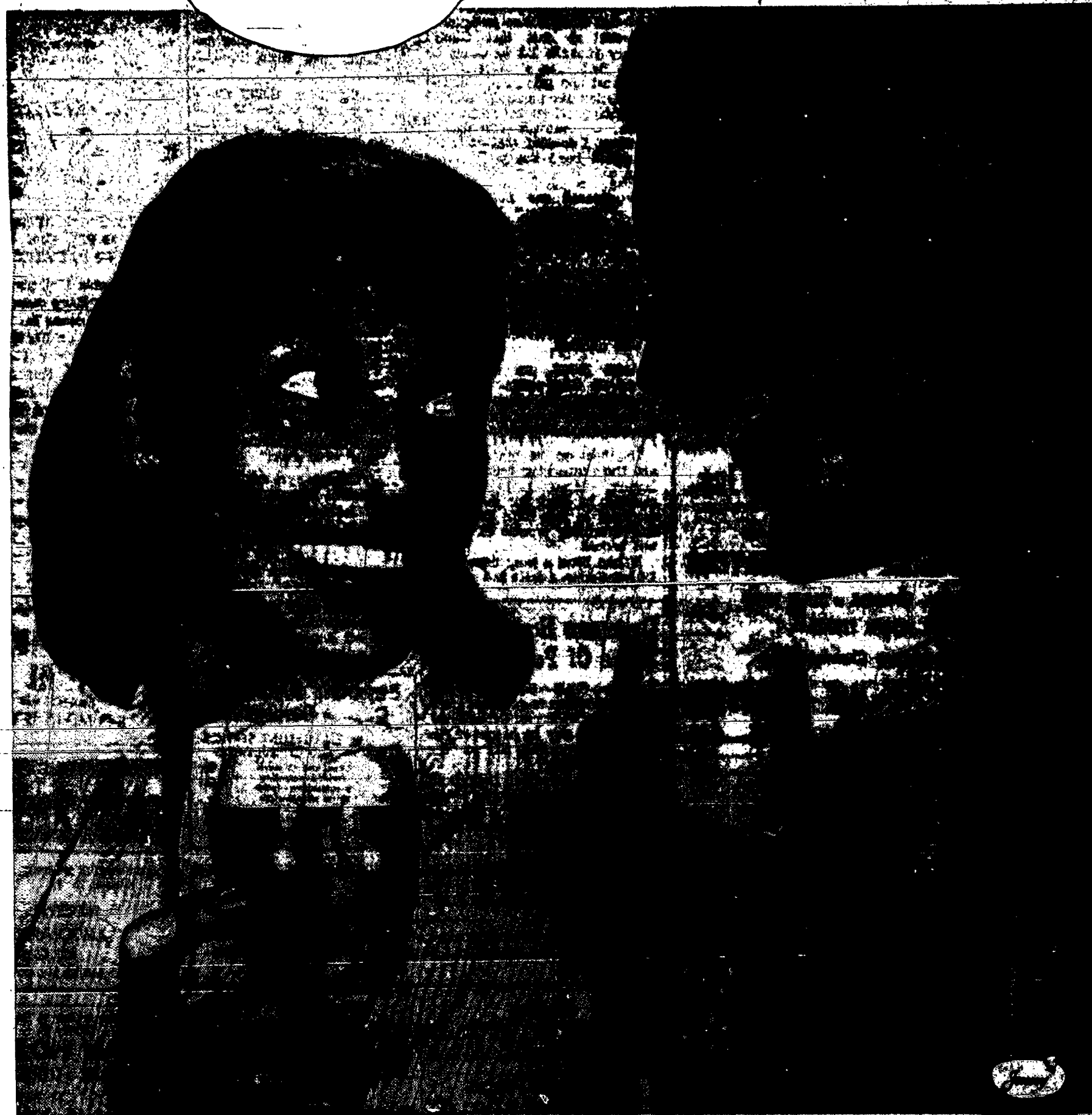
The week's social activities will come to a close with a dinner in college dining hall Saturday evening, at which Freshmen will be guests of the Juniors.

## Niagara University Gets Federal Grant

Niagara University, N.Y.—from the receipt of a grant of \$12,338 from the Federal Government for Psychiatric Nursing in the Niagara University College of Nursing, has been announced by the Very Rev. Vincent T. Swords, C.M., president of the university.

The grant awarded under the provisions of the Mental Health Act, marks the second consecutive year that the local College of Nursing has received such an award. Last year, Niagara received a grant of \$12,471 for its Mental Health and Psychiatric Nursing program.

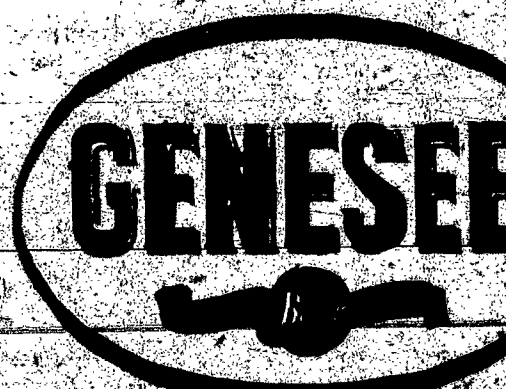
