### AMONG WOMEN Not Miniature Adults

As a student of literary criticism I once prepared a paper on the changing role of the child in literature.

In this I contrasted the child as depicted in French and English romantic and realistic writings. As I recall, I concluded with current literature in which the child was treated as a distinct individual and not as a miniature adult, idealized or brutalized by the author depending on what kind of society he was delineating.

I think the pendulum in life has moved considerably since I finished that paper. Looking around me I am tempted to conclude that neither the child himself nor his parent wishes to conform to the Victorian ideal.

Whatever the cause in this seeking of a common denominator, the parents often find themselves making judgments of unsuitable immaturity, and the children, trying to act like grown-ups, are missing so many of the pure delights of the preteen years in trying unbecomingly to act like miniature grownups.

As might be expected the "going steady" pattern which has been so evident in the high school years has been gradually slipping down into the grade school level. That it has apparently reached proportions that might be described as surprising is evidenced in the fact that the Bishop of Spokane, Washington addressed a pastoral letter to his people on Sunday, August 25.

AN ACCOUNT which I read of the letter stated that the bishop dealt "vigorously with the problem and laid down some stern regulations for parents". He spoke sharply of premature social contacts between boys and girls, "certain types of social activities among our grade school children which should be delayed until a later age."

In an effort to aid parents in dealing with grade-school social activities Bishop Tolon stated that activities are not to be attended which encourage children to imitate adults, in which boys and girls are paired off in couples, where ball room dancing is an activity or where supervision is lax or non-existent. He also stated that all dating while in grade school is prohibited.

In a word the children are not miniature adults and should not try to ape adult social patterns. Those of us who have children of our own would do well to read carefully the following challenging statement which I encountered recently in my reading:

"TOO MUCH sophistication too early for the young is not only a good way to make them insufferable snobs; it is also the devil's way of steering temptations in their path."
