Annual Tea Slated By Penn Yan PTA

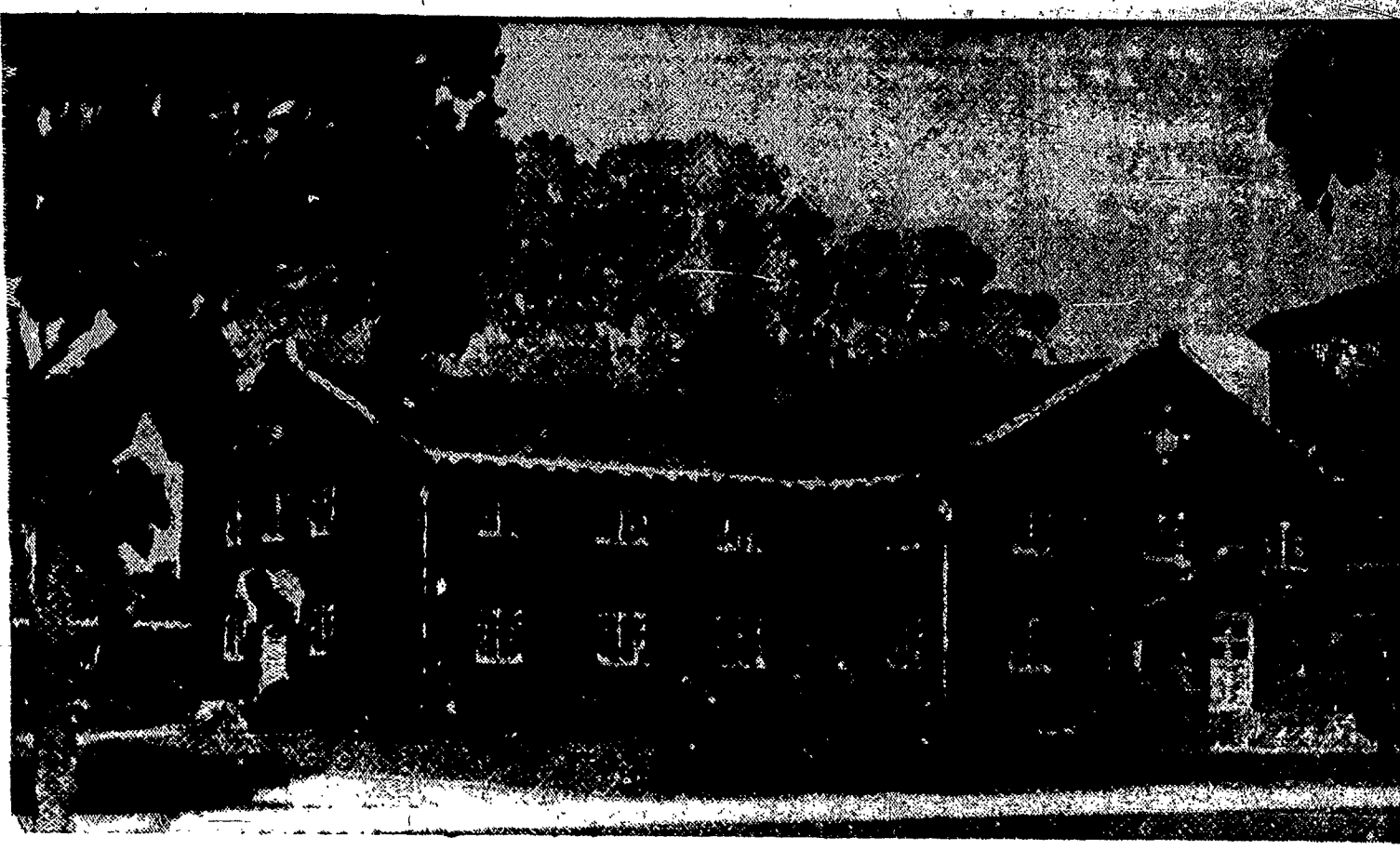
