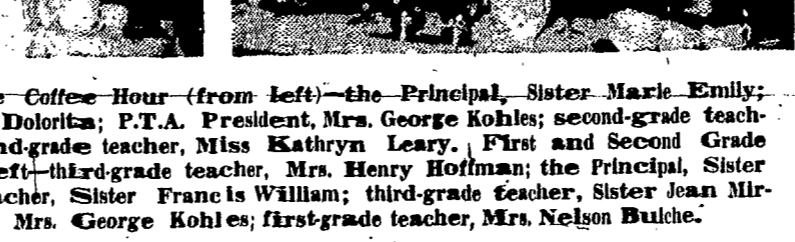
Teeth Retreat

Steuben DC Women Hear Father Collins in Hornell

Hornell — Peace of mind, an essential for true happiness, results from complete submission to the will of God, the Rev. Vincent P. Collins told a First Saturday luncheon group at the American Legion Home on Seneca St. Father Collins, assistant pastor of St. Ann's Church, was principal speaker at the luncheon which was attended by more than 50 women. The luncheon was the first in the eighth annual series sponsored by the Steuben Deaconry, Diocesan Council of Catholic Women, in honor of Our Lady of Fatima. Father Collins reminded the women that God created Adam and Eve in a state of perfect happiness. They forfeited that happiness when they sinned. "WE'VE LOST the knack of being happy through the effects of original sin," Father Collins said. He added that too often our ideas of what constitutes happiness are distorted. We confuse happiness with material possessions, human respect, influence and power. "Happiness can be defined as contentment which is the ability to accept conditions as they are, rather than resent life because things are not as we wish they might be. "We have in our faith a perfect reason for acceptance and that is the knowledge that we are doing the will of God. God created us with free will — we can choose to serve Him or we can choose sin," Father Collins continued. "THE CONDITIONS of disorder existing today are the result of sin — conforming to our own wills and not God's. We might as well realize that God permits this disorder for our own good so that we might merit eternal happiness. Father Collins offered several practical suggestions for doing the will of God in everyday life. In addition to the obvious obligation of fulfilling duties which are staring you in the face," he added: "If there is a choice between two things to do — and both are equally good — take that which will make you happier. "If something unpleasant occurs, unite your sufferings to that of the suffering of God — re-
