Pulpits For Gospel, Not Civic News

St. Paul — (RNS) — Archbishop William O. Brady of St. Paul warned here of a "growing tendency" to "turn our churches into mere social agencies, to make civil servants of them, or to use our pulpits to put the drama for... propaganda."

Writing in the Catholic Bulletin, the official organ of the St. Paul archdiocese, he deplored these "subtle substitutions from Sunday's holiness."

THE ARCHBISHOP said that "certain governmental agencies have solicited the use of our Sunday pulpits to promote Navy day, civil defense, mental health programs and other like topics. There is no doubt as to the value of these services," he said, "but none of them belong in the worship of God."

"At times the promoters of such causes have been a little annoyed that such propositions were shunted to our newspapers or to our lay societies, where they really belong," Archbishop Brady wrote.

"It does still seem a goodly

Catholic principle to reassert that Sunday belongs to God, our churches are for God's worship and our pulpits are for preaching the Gospel. Nothing else should occupy our Sunday time of prayer."

The prelate also said that perhaps Sunday church announcements are too much concerned with "parish dinners, basket socials, change of dates for society meetings and other like secondary matters." He said that "few listen" to such announcements which "often serve only to shorten the time for the Gospel reading and the sermon."

"Such trivia should be printed in a parish bulletin and given to the people to take home," Archbishop Brady said. "If objection is made that the people will throw them away or never read them, neither will they listen nor act upon what they hear."

Boston Into Center Sputnik Of Truth

Boston — (NC) — The Paulist Fathers have provided Boston with its own "sputniks," Archbishop Richard J. Cushing told 2,000 people here.

Speaking at the dedication of the new \$1,700,000 Father Gillis Catholic Information Center, the Boston Archbishop described the apostolic work of the Paulists as "our own little satellite... a sputnik of truth."

Just as the "sputnik" moves through outer space, he said, the influence of the Paulists "will move around the area, through an apostolic priestly and laity we will do our part in saving the world from sinfulness."

Archbishop Cushing described the Russian satellite as "a wonderful scientific accomplishment," but warned that it could be an "instrument for the destruction of humanity." Any mistake now could lead to another world war, he said and stressed the need for more prayers.

MORE THAN 800 persons crowded into the chapel of the new center—built to accommodate 600—and another 1,200 stood outside on Park Street and on Boston Common to attend the dedication. A public address system brought the prayers and hymns to the overflow crowd.

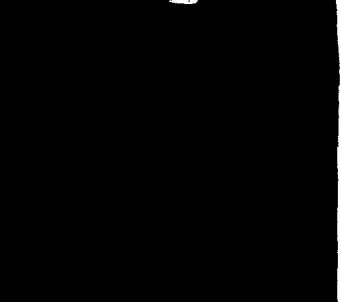
Archbishop Cushing paid tribute to the late Paulist Father James M. Gillis. An editor and author, Father Gillis was a consultant for the N.C.W.C. Feature Service for 26 years.

Most of the opposition to the Catholic Church today is a result of ignorance, Archbishop Cushing said. Where real knowledge exists, there is little genuine prejudice or hatred of the Catholic faith, he added.

The Archbishop said that the scholarship of men like Jacques Maritain can contribute to Catholics' understanding of the relationship between the sacred and the secular.

Rosary For Peace In Little Rock

Little Rock — (NC) — Peaceful solution to the integration crisis is object of prayers led by Father R. E. McDevitt of St. Andrew's Cathedral, Little Rock, Ark. Similar services were held in 31 Churches and synagogues throughout Arkansas, on Columbus Day.

Little Rock Prayer Rite Asks Integration Peace

Little Rock — (NC) — Hundreds gathered in the 12 Little Rock area Catholic churches to pray before the Blessed Sacrament for a peaceful solution to racial integration difficulties here.

The Catholic services were part of the special hour of prayer sponsored in this strife-torn

city by Catholic, Protestant and Jewish religious leaders in the hope of easing tensions.

Bishop Albert L. Fletcher of Little Rock, who appealed earlier to Catholics to attend services, was in the sanctuary of St. Andrew's Cathedral in downtown Little Rock.

In each Catholic church, the Rosary, the Litany of the Blessed Virgin and the Church's prayer for those in civil authority were recited. Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament followed these prayers.

At the cathedral ceremonies, members of the 101st Airborne Division, which has been enforcing a Federal court order for integration at Central High School and members of the federalized National Guard were present.

THE NIGHT BEFORE the city-wide church prayer services, a group of about 24 Baptist ministers who favor segregation sponsored their own prayer meeting.

An estimated 600 persons attended the meeting held at the Fundamentalist Central Baptist Church. They said they were praying for divine approval of a plan to keep peace in Little Rock through segregation and with the withdrawal of the nine Negro students from Central High School.

The pastor of the church, Rev. M. L. Moser, Sr., said his congregation could not participate in the other church services for a peaceful solution because these were sponsored by Jews "who do not believe in the deity of the Lord Jesus Christ," by Catholics who "while believing in the deity of the Lord, pray through the 'modernistic persuasion' who do not believe in the Virgin Mary," and by Protestants who "do not believe in the deity of the Lord Jesus Christ."

New Churches Built For Convert Influx

Terre Haute, Ind. — (NC) — Five new churches and chapels have been built in the diocese of Terre Haute in the past three months from the schismatic Jehovah's church and non-Christian bodies.

Home, Church Enlisted To Combat Delinquency

Concord, N. H. — (NC) — Catholic and Protestant churches have cooperated in an undertaking in this New Hampshire capital which has reduced juvenile delinquency considerably. The accomplishment came while

elsewhere state and national delinquency trends increased. New Hampshire's juvenile courts, for instance, reported an increase in cases from 836 to 1,150 in 1956. At the same time, the number of cases in Concord steadily declined.

WHEN A PARENT is reluctant to have a child brought to the State Child Guidance Clinic for psychiatric treatment because it is feared a "stigma" would result, Juvenile Court Judge Donald Watson meets with parents to show them the need for the special treatment.

In other cases, rebellious children have been placed in "custody" of their priest or minister, the judge said.

Rites Consecrate Chaldean Bishops

Baghdad, Iraq — (NC) — Two priests of the Chaldean Rite have been consecrated bishops, bringing to 11 the number of bishops now governing the faithful of this ancient rite in Asia Minor.

Archbishop Yusuf VII Ghannima, Chaldean Patriarch of Babylon, officiated at the ceremony in St. Joseph's Church here.

Consecrated as Bishop of Amadiyah in northern Iraq was Father Raphael Bidawid, who formerly was Patriarchal Administrator of the Archdiocese of Kerkuk in Iraq. He replaces Bishop Raphael Rabban who was recently named Archbishop of Kerkuk.

Father Andraus Sana was consecrated as Bishop of Aqra, also in northern Iraq. Before his consecration, Bishop Sana was Vicar General of the Diocese of Amadiyah.

BOOK SHELF On The Sacred Heart

THE CATHOLIC LIFE ANNUAL, 1958, edited by E. Willigig. Bruce \$7. \$3.95.

THERE IS A PLACE FOR GOD IN BUSINESS, by George Murrin. Pageant '56. \$3.00.

COMMON SENSE, by Rev. Joseph McSorley. Bruce \$7. \$2.95.

These three books are singly and together designed to foster the Catholic spirit of any family, and to make the members of a family feel not merely that they are in the world and not of it, but that they can bring the world along in their own happy direction.

THE CATHOLIC LIFE ANNUAL gives great promise: Here is a history of the "Art of Illumination," an account of the New York of 1837, short biographies of Archbishop Carroll and Mother Elizabeth Seton, and the life of Bishop Ford of China as the Most Reverend Fashion Sheen tells it in "America Needs a Saint."

Then follows the life of Dr. Alexis Carrel, whose belief in the Miracles of Lourdes drove him from Medical circles to live his great life of experiment and investigation in the United States.

PART II offers articles full of up-to-the-minute comment on gift making, cribmaking, Christmas observance in the parish, Christmas music together with a long and beautiful story by Stephen Benet called "The Bishop's Beggar," a talk on the Epiphany by eloquent Rev. McCorry, S.J., and a tender and cornical meditation on "The Irish and the Jews and Everybody Else." Good measure and running over.

Nobody needs an introduction to Father Joseph McSorley, confessor of confessors and fatherly advisor of advisors. His friends are legion, and COMMON SENSE, on God and sanity and foolishness and how to live, will bring him more friends.

THE VOLUME subtitled SPIRITUAL GUIDE FOR BUSINESS, by Murrin, is a handbook for daily use, promising to the businessman or woman, the desk of counterworker, days of personal peace and profit while extending in simple, practical ways the kingdom of God on earth.

It is a book on how to win friends and influence people by concentrating on God, and bringing one's mind and heart into line steadily and patiently, that His Will may be freely done.

Pray As Fire Destroys School

Ottumwa, — (NC) — Kneeling in prayer are nuns and students of Ottumwa Heights Junior College and Academy, Ottumwa, Iowa, as flames cause an estimated \$2-million damage. 75 nuns and more than 300 girls escaped the holocaust without injury. Rebuilding fund has received contributions from Protestants, Catholics and Jews in Ottumwa.

All Faiths Aid Nuns Rebuild Gutted College

Ottumwa, Iowa — (NC) — Members of all faiths in this city are pitching in to help rebuild a Catholic institution here that was destroyed in a two-million-dollar fire.

The blaze, of undetermined origin, left only a skeletal frame of a four-story building housing the Ottumwa Heights Academy and Junior College and the motherhouse of the Sisters of the Holy Humility of Mary.

SEVENTY-FIVE Sisters and 130 resident students, whose wardrobes and books were lost in the fire, have been given temporary shelter in the abandoned buildings of a wartime navy airbase.

Residents of Ottumwa, which has a population of about 33,000, have volunteered skilled services to help the Sisters re-establish their central plant, college and high school in makeshift surroundings. Heads of local unions and the AFL-CIO chapter made public appeals to their men to donate a weekend of labor at the airbase, unused since 1945.

The Masonic Temple, local Jewish clubs, Protestant organizations and a host of local societies have donated time, work and money to the victims of the fire or to the cause of rebuilding.

Under orders from Gov. Herschel C. Loveless of Iowa, the National Guard dispatched trucks of loaned kitchen equipment and bedding to tide the nuns and students over the disaster period.
