Area College Presidents Join In State-Wide Drive

Presidents of 23 colleges in New York State are scheduled to arrive in Rochester Monday evening, Oct. 21, for the "Presidents' Campaign" of the Empire State Foundation of Independent Liberal Arts Colleges.

The 23 educators will move across the state, flying from Buffalo to Rochester, Syracuse, Utica and Albany. They will stop a day in each city.

Area college presidents who will be traveling with the group are Mother M. Helene of Nazareth College, Rochester; Dr. Katherine Gillette Bliley of Keuka Park; the Rev. Dr. Louis M. Hirschhorn of Hobart and William Smith Colleges, Geneva; Dr. J. Ralph Murray of Elmira College; Dr. M. Ellis Drake of Alfred University and Dr. Louis J. Long of Wells College, Aurora.

In Rochester the group will meet with area alumni, trustees, parents and friends of the 23 member colleges. Tuesday, Oct. 22, the presidents and area representatives will call on Rochester area industrial and business concerns.

Rochester area headquarters will be in the Sheraton Hotel. A meeting of the area representatives will be held on the Starlight Roof Monday evening at 8 p.m. Tuesday morning a briefing and breakfast will be held at 8 in the Victorian Room at the hotel.
