

St. Joseph Hospital, Nursing School Announce 8 Staff Appointments

Eight appointments at St. Joseph Hospital, Elmira affecting both the hospital and the school of nursing are announced today.

Sister Bernard Marie was named administrative assistant. This is the first time that this position has been filled at the local hospital. The duty of this position is to carry through to completion the specific projects assigned her by the administrator.

She engages in research, and prepares statistical and other special reports under the direction of the administrator. Sister Bernard Marie has a master's degree in nursing from St. Louis University.

Sister Paul Marie, head nurse of the medical division, is a graduate of Strong Memorial Hospital School of Nursing, Rochester, and has pursued studies at Nazareth College, Rochester, Syracuse University, and St. Louis University.

NEWLY APPOINTED at the hospital laboratory is Dr. Joseph M. Hsu, biochemist and nutritionist. He received his doctor of philosophy degree from State College of Washington in 1933.

Since then he has been staff member of the Johns Hopkins University, department of biochemistry. Dr. Hsu has been active in research. In the past five years he has been author of co-author of more than 20 scientific papers. His main interest is the role of vitamin B₁₂ and folic acid in metabolism.

He is a member of the New York Academy of Science, American Association of Advanced Science, American Chemical Society, American Association of University Professors, Sigma Xi and Alpha Zeta.

Dr. Hsu is married to Kung-Sung, a pediatrician at St. Mary's Hospital, Baltimore, and has one daughter, Lily.

Sister Marie Michael R.N., formerly supervisor and instructor in pediatric nursing, appointed as educational director. A graduate of Nazareth College, Sister holds a master's degree in nursing from Catholic University of America.

500 See Bishop Casey Dedicate New Our Lady Of Lourdes School

Solemn dedication ceremonies were conducted last Sunday by His Excellency Auxiliary Bishop Casey for the new school of Our Lady of Lourdes. More than 500 parishioners, friends and delegations of priests and Sisters from throughout the diocese were in attendance.

CEREMONIES started in the church where the Bishop spoke on the importance of Catholic education. He said the vast increase in the birth rate has made necessary the construction of many new schools and the additions to those schools already in existence.

In concluding remarks the Bishop urged the prayers of all that there might be an increase in vocations so that the diocese might staff the schools with teaching Sisters. Solemn Benediction of the Most Blessed Sacrament concluded the church ceremonies.

LED BY AN HONOR guard of Fourth Degree Knights of Columbus from Elmira Assembly, the Bishop and priests marched in procession to the school where the Bishop conducted the age old rite blessing the walls and placed a Crucifix, symbol of the spirit of Catholic education. He also blessed the several rooms, asking Divine guidance for those who teach and study.

Following the ceremonies, an open house was held during which the public inspected the school and met the Sisters of Mercy who teach at the school. The Ladies Rosary-Ally Society served a buffet luncheon to the nuns.

The new school, which was opened for the first time this fall, is located at Demarest Pkwy. and W. First St. in West Elmira. Construction of the school began in 1956 and the cornerstone was laid last October. It has eight classrooms, a kindergarten and other modern facilities. It is one story of stone construction.

St. Charles Parish, Elmira Exceeds Goal By \$40,000

St. Charles Borromeo Parish building fund appeal, made last Sunday by a team of more than 250 volunteer workers, has exceeded its minimum goal of \$100,000 by more than \$40,000, with the final results still to be determined.

The campaign committee, headed by Fred G. Wilson, announced that more than \$140,000 has been received, with several contribution cards still outstanding.

THE AMOUNT subscribed over the goal will lessen the financial burden of the parish. It was stated, as less money will have to be borrowed to construct the proposed new church. The minimum amount necessary to begin construction was placed at \$100,000. The complete cost of the new church is expected to be in excess of \$200,000.

According to present plans, a 500 seating church will be erected on Oakwood Ave., just north of the present rectory. A hall of more than 3,000 square feet is included in the plans. The hall will contain ample kitchen space for parish functions.

It is planned to install movable partitions in the hall so that it may be divided into several private rooms for catechetical work or society meetings.

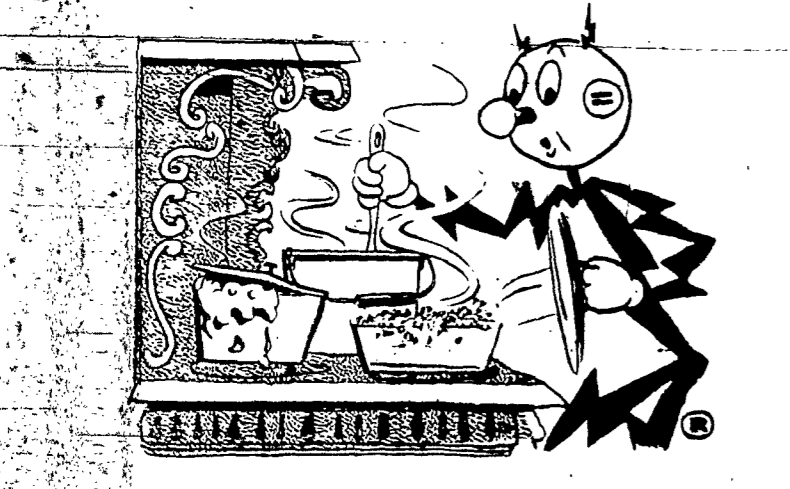
