

Building Fund Campaign Started At Immaculate

Start of a Debt Removal and Parish Building Improvement Fund Raising Campaign with a minimum goal of \$65,000 was announced by the Rev. Msgr. John S. Randall, pastor of Immaculate Conception Parish, Plymouth Ave. South at all Masses, Sunday.

"Our need is urgent," Msgr. Randall explained. "Our buildings have given long years of service. They will continue to do so if they are maintained in a sound structural condition."

"Some repairs are needed immediately on our church convent, school and rectory. Our interest payments and ordinary overhead do not leave sufficient money for repairs. A parish fund raising campaign is the only reasonable and practical solution to our problem."

"I am confident," Monsignor Randall added, "that the willing spirit of sacrifice and generosity will make our campaign a success. We dedicate our campaign to Our Blessed Mother, patroness of our parish and ask her help in this parish effort."

FIRST GENERAL meeting of the building fund campaign will be held on Tuesday at 8 p.m. in the school hall. Immaculate Conception Parish is one of the oldest in the city of Rochester dating back to 1819 when it was founded. The centennial celebration was observed in 1919.

Immaculate Conception Parish has a proud record of building a new church, more beautiful than the one that had been destroyed. In later years with the addition of a front vestibule, the present structure has become a well known landmark in Rochester.

Bronze plaques in the vestibule silently but eloquently perpetuate the names of parishioners who gave the supreme sacrifice for their country during World War One and World War Two.

Through the years, priests and people of the parish have served their community with distinction in high places of responsibility. In all a proud record has been established that is continuing to be recorded as the people of the parish now under take a campaign to preserve the past, meet the needs of the present and look forward to the future, a spokesman said.

Solemn opening of the campaign will be held Friday, Oct. 25, at 7:45 p.m. His Excellency, Auxiliary Bishop Casey will preside. A large turnout is expected.

Campaign officers are honorary chairman, Monsignor Randall, pastor; campaign moderator, Rev. W. Darcy Bolger; general chairman, Honorable Leo T. Minetti; associate general chairman, J. Arthur McGee and E. William Hammond.
