Annual food shower for Sisters of St. Joseph at St. Peter and Paul convent, Elmira will be held today (Friday).

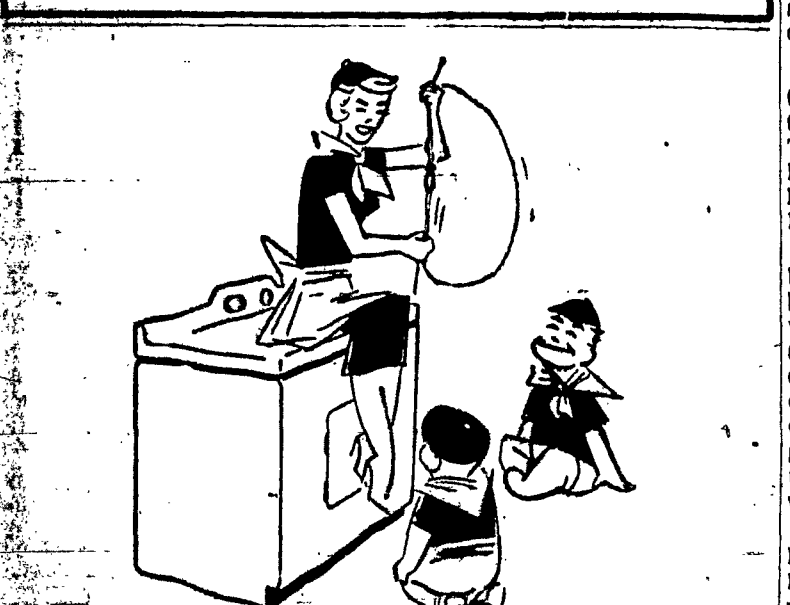

## Teenagers Catholic Influence Studied At High School Forum Held In Ithaca

Ithaca — Catholic students of Ithaca High School and Newfield Central School were hosts on Sunday afternoon, Oct. 20, to Catholic high school students of Van Etten, Interlaken, Trumansburg, Fairport and Mendon. About 150 were in attendance and took part in a Forum on the theme "How Catholic is My Influence?"

The Forum was held in the parish hall and the program opened with prayer led by Fr. Rev. Msgr. William Byrne, V.F., pastor of Immaculate Conception Church. An address of welcome was given by Thomas Smith, president of the Catholic Youth Organization in Ithaca.

Robert Meyers of Fairport gave a talk on the theme: "How Catholic is my influence at home, in school, and with friends?" Detailed discussion followed in which students worked in groups of about 10 each and at the end of each discussion period, the appointed leader reported the group's ideas and suggestions.

AFTER THE discussions, Chairman Smith summarized the conclusions of the students as follows: Catholic students' influence at home is enhanced by families doing things together, following the example of Christ in His home — the Holy Family of Nazareth. It was pointed out that homes are happier where the children are obedient and respectful to their parents, just as the Christ Child was subject to His parents even though He was superior to them.

IN SCHOOL, Catholic students can exert their influence for good by respecting the authority of their teachers; by setting good example in clean speech and modest dress; and by practicing good sportsmanship.

IN INFLUENCING friends, the students felt that sincerity was very important and that being interested in others is following the command of Christ in loving God and neighbor. They deemed it important the necessity of trying to live up to Christ's teachings and to conduct their lives in a way expected of them. One example cited was on dating where one's conscience is the law of God which guides their behavior. The students realized the necessity of being leaders, and emphasized the great value to them of Catholic get-togethers such as the Forum, where ideas are exchanged and ideals are fostered.

Melody Leone spoke on the influence of the Catholic student through participation in the parish Confraternity of Christian Doctrine. She stated ways in which students can help in spreading the knowledge and love of God.

She cited the six divisions of the Confraternity which are Lay Teachers; Visitors or Fishers; Apostles of Good Will; Parent-educators; and Religious Discussion group leaders.

She said that students could begin assisting in the program by being helpers in many ways which could allow parents to take a more active part in the religious activities of the parish. Discussion followed her talk, but due to time limit, no active program of student participation in the work of the Confraternity was decided upon.

AT THE CONCLUSION of the Forum, the students attended Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament in Church. They returned to their homes.

SUPREME COURT Justice William J. Brennan, Jr. and two other federal judges will preside.

The four Notre Dame law students will compete for the Clarence F. Manion Award, provided annually by the former dean of the law school. They will also be trying for cash prizes presented by the Notre Dame Law Association.

The two winners will represent the University at the regional moot court competition to be held in Chicago, next month.

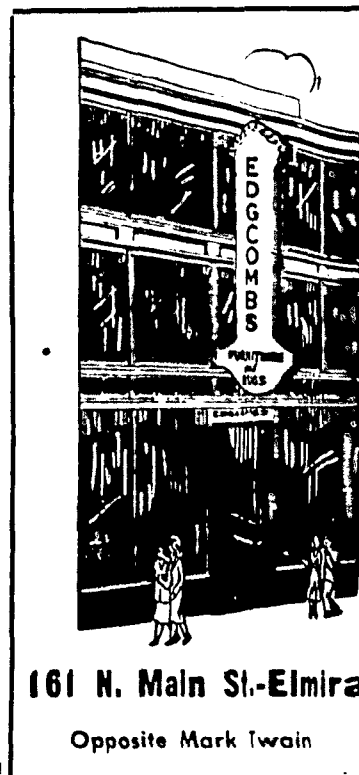
