

McQuaid Seniors Making Closed Retreats

A great influence in the lives of seniors now at McQuaid Jesuit High School is being exerted by a book written 400 years ago. It is reported at the school this week.

The book is "The Spiritual Exercises" and the seniors are learning of them through Father Thomas Burke, S.J., at Christ the King Retreat House in Syracuse.

Fathers, Sons At Aquinas Hear Speakers, View Films

Several hundred fathers and sons of Aquinas last night enjoyed a closed retreat just as an army withdraws from a battle in order to regroup and strengthen itself and plan a new attack.

The Knights of Aquinas withdrew themselves from all worldly concerns, pleasures and work to examine where each has been lacking in his service of Christ and to plan new methods of following Him.

St. Ignatius of Loyola said that the purpose of a retreat is conquest of self and the regulation of one's life in such a way so that no desire is made under the influence of any inordinate attachment. In other words, "Knowing thyself, conquer thyself." One knows himself by measuring his spiritual stature with the standards of Christ's love and precepts.

The retreat is characterized by three external signs, silent prayer and meditation. Silence is a strict requisite for the success of a retreat for if one is trying to talk to God, the world has time to talk with others. Prayer in the retreat is both public and private.

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THE MEDITATION in the retreat is made upon the three parts of the Gospel of the day, the first being the Book of Matthew, the second the Book of Mark, the third the Book of Luke. The retreat is made so that the retreatant himself would be able to receive the love of God for him and what return he should make for this love. Having learned of the love of God and having come to

know the true value of things, the retreatant is able to return to the world with a new perspective.

Father Thomas Burke, S.J., the retreat master, is familiar to all the seniors. In 1951 he was the first retreat to these same men to open McQuaid's first academic year. Father Burke, a pioneer in closed retreats for boys, is a member of the mission level and has had considerable experience with teenagers.

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McQuaid To Meet Livonia, Aquinas Faces Watertown

McQuaid Jesuit High School will play its final football game of the season tomorrow, (Saturday) when it meets Livonia at McQuaid field on Elmwood Ave. at 2 p.m. Aquinas Institute will journey to Watertown to meet the Watertown High eleven at 2 p.m. the same day.

A fumble and an intercepted pass resulted in two touchdowns for the Knights before the half. Another intercepted pass resulted in the final score of the game for

the Knights in the fourth quarter.

Aquinas dropped its fourth game of the season Sunday at Aquinas Stadium against North Catholic of Pittsburgh by a score of 33-12. North Catholic seemed to enjoy the snow as they ran up a total of 282 yards rushing as opposed to a meager 73 for the Little Irish.

It was "Linesman Day" as center Bob Bates and guard Joe Camilli scored the two Irish touchdowns.

The Aquinas Jayvee team defeated Notre Dame High of Batavia 26-7 last Monday at Batavia. They will meet Palmyra-Macedon at 2 p.m. tomorrow in Palmyra.
