## Bishop Dedicates Nazareth Library

His Excellency Bishop Kearney solemnly dedicated the new \$800,000 Nazareth College library last Sunday and presided at rites that followed in the college auditorium with more than 500 in attendance.

Chief speaker for the dedication rites was Ewald B. Nyquist, New York State deputy commissioner of education.

In his talk, Nyquist stated that college and community libraries are becoming more and more important not just for students but for the general public as a means of self-education and in relieving the duties of over-burdened teachers.

He mentioned the accelerated speed at which learning advances today, using as an example the launching of "Sputnik" and cited the rapidly with which knowledge becomes obsolete.

"You shall know the truth and the truth shall make you free," Bishop Kearney quoted in addressing the large audience, which he said summed up the significance of the library as a storehouse of wisdom.

Other speakers included the Very Rev. John F. Murphy, C.S.B., president of St. John Fisher College; the Honorable Peter Barry, mayor of Rochester; Rev. Mother M. Helene, superior general of the Sisters of St. Joseph and Nazareth president; and Otto A. Shults, chairman of the college advisory board.

Speakers were introduced by Father William H. Shannon, chaplain of the women's college. Housing over 38,000 volumes, the new library has a capacity of 100,000, according to Sister M. Dominic, librarian.

The spacious main reading room is dominated by a large stained glass window of St. Jerome, patron of scholars, and is the work of Rochester artist John C. Meinhan.

The new building was designed in collegiate gothic style by architects Wansor and Northrup and built by A. W. Hopeman and Sons.

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## Mercy Sisters To Seek Funds For College

Friends of the Sisters of Mercy throughout the diocese will be asked soon for fund pledges to aid the Sisters as they plan construction of a new junior college building in Rochester while still indebted on a high school in Elmira.

Construction of a building for Catherine McAuley Junior College, a teacher training college for Sisters which is now housed in one room in Mercy Mother Superior's House, 2411 Lake Geneva in Spring, Mother Mary Magdalene, R.S.M., mother general of the community, announced today.

In operation since 1951, the college provides a three-year course for young Sisters in preparation for teaching in Catholic schools. It has a current enrollment of nearly 100. The college has received a provisional charter from the state and must have a building by 1959 in order to qualify for a permanent charter. Sister Mary de Pazzi is dean.

Mother Magdalene pointed out that it is much less costly for the community to train its own Sisters than to have to send them to colleges elsewhere for fundamental education degrees. Sisters then complete their major degree at nearby colleges.

She also noted that transfer of the college to its own building which will be west of the Motherhouse will relieve overcrowded conditions in the Motherhouse and allow proper facilities for new vocations in the Order.

FORMATION OF a committee for fund solicitation is underway. Committee leaders thus far will meet at 8 p.m. Thursday, Nov. 7, at Mercy High School, Elmira. Members of the special gifts committee and team captains of other divisions will be invited to a kick-off dinner on Nov. 26. Special solicitation is scheduled in December, and general solicitation in January.

The Sisters of Mercy teach in two high schools — Mercy High in Rochester and Notre Dame High in Elmira — and in 22 parochial schools. They also staff St. James Mercy Hospital in Hornell. There is a continuing growing demand for more parochial school Sister teachers, Mother Magdalene said.

Assistance in the form of one and two-year pledges will be sought among alumnae of their schools and among friends of the Sisters. Total need of the community is \$2,000,000, which includes current indebtedness and the estimated cost \$1,250,000 cost of the proposed college building. Ground was broken for the new building in September. Completion is slated for September, 1959.

After trips in 1956 and 1957 Dr. LaLonde plans a similar trip to Africa, where he helped to establish a dispensary conducted by the Irish Medical Missionaries.

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## Sisters Of St. Joseph List Teachers' Institute

Sisters of St. Joseph of the Diocese of Rochester will conduct their annual Community Teachers Institute at Nazareth Academy on Lake Avenue Tuesday, Nov. 12.

Reverend Mother M. Helene, general superior of the Community and sponsor of the Institute, will deliver the welcome address.

Sister Agnes Cecilia, principal of Nazareth Academy, is general chairman of the Secondary School Section. Sister M. Florida, supervisor of elementary schools conducted by the Sisters of St. Joseph, is chairman of the Elementary School Section.

NAZARETH ACADEMY will be host to the more than 600 Sisters attending from the four high schools and 58 elementary schools in the diocese conducted by the Sisters of St. Joseph. Monsignor Charles V. Boyle, superintendent of schools, will close the Institute with an address and Benediction.

The Rev. Charles B. Connell, executive and spiritual director of Nazareth Academy, will open the program with Mass in the school auditorium at 9 a.m. The Rev. James Redmond, S.J., in the keynote address following the Mass, will speak at the afternoon session on "Meeting the Moral Problems of Youth."

Among the outstanding educators and lecturers is Mrs. Vera Dean, editor of Foreign Policy Association Bulletin, and Headline Series, Mrs. Dean will address the secondary schools Social Studies teachers on "Anti-Westernism: Cause and Cure."

MRS. DEAN'S extensive travel in Asia, including a summer semester at the Indian School of International Studies where she occupied the chair of American History and Institutions; stopovers in Japan, Hong Kong, Bangkok, and Singapore with resulting contacts, led to the inter-departmental course at Smith College, inaugurated by Mrs. Dean. As visiting Professor of Government, she directed the "University of Rochester's new program on non-Western Civilization. As an author she is known for the following books: "Foreign Policy Without Fear," "The United States and Europe," "The United States and the Nature of the Non-Western World."

The Mathematics teachers will have an Associate Supervisor of Mathematics Education, Bruno B. Baker, of the Education Department of the University of the State of New York, in "The New Integrated Program in Mathematics." Supervisor Baker has had nearly 11 years experience as a teacher of high school mathematics. He has been associated with the Education Department since 1954.

Carl Freudenreich, also of the State Department of Education, will address the teachers of English in the Secondary Schools on the question, "What is English?" Doctor B. John Syrakel, instructor in General Biology and Meteorology of the State University Teachers College at Brockport, New York, will discuss with the science group the subject, "Survival of Freedoms Through Science Education." In addition to 8 years of teaching on College level, Dr. Syrakel has had prior experience in high school general science and biology.

David Davis, instructor in the Geneva Junior High School, will speak on "The State Syllabus and General Science." Miss Alice Foley, director of instruction in Brighton Schools, will address the Foreign Language group on the topic, "Foreign Language in Today's Schools."

PRESIDING CHAIRMEN will be Father Connell, Sisters Saint Dorothy, Grace Marie, Rose Adelaide, Rose Eileen, Rose Ellen, and Mary de Porres, all Sisters of St. Joseph.

Chairmen presiding at the Elementary Schools Sessions will be the Rev. Albert Schmacky, director of the confraternity of Christian Doctrine; Sister M. Jamesetta, dean of the Elementary Teacher Training Department of Nazareth College; Sister Mary Patricia, assistant supervisor of elementary schools conducted by the Sisters of St. Joseph; Sister Rosina, principal of St. Lucy's School; Sister Marie Rene, principal of St. Joseph's School, Wayland; Sister M. Valerian, principal of Most Precious Blood School; Sister Edwina Teresa, teacher at St. Augustine School; Sister Teresa Martin, teacher at St. Augustine.

Speakers for the Elementary School Division include Sister Maureen, M.H.S.H. on "Guidance Through the Teaching of Religion"; Sister M. Judene, M.H.S.H. on "Materials and Techniques for Teaching Religion in the Primary Grades."
