Father Quetchenbach Sails To Philippine Mission

San Francisco, Calif. — After 14 years of preparation, Rev. Raymond Quetchenbach, S.V.D., of the Divine Word Missionary, has set out for his long desired goal — the missions. Father Quetchenbach's ship, the Japan Bear, left San Francisco, Oct. 30, enroute to the Philippines.

Father Quetchenbach is a native of Rochester, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Albert Quetchenbach, 35 Ranch Village Lane, Roches-
ter.

He completed his high school studies at Sacred Heart Mission Seminary, Girard, Pa. His philosophical and theological training was brought to a close at St. Mary Mission Seminary, Techny, Illinois, where he was ordained on June 9, 1957.

THE YOUNG PRIEST looks forward to many fruitful years of labor in the Philippines. He expects his first assignment will be teaching at the Divine Word Seminary of Christ the King in Manila.

Father Quetchenbach is following the missionary footsteps of three fellow Rochesterians: Rev. Charles Erb, his uncle, the director of the Mission Exhibit held in Rochester in October of 1953; Rev. Bernard LeFrois, now at the Seminary of the Immaculate Conception, Vigan; and Rev. Richard Kraft, missionary in Abra, Philippines. All are Divine Word Missionaries.

Father Quetchenbach will join 200 other Divine Word Missionaries, who, besides doing other mission work, are in charge of six colleges and teach in six Seminaries in the Philippine Islands. Father Raymond Quetchenbach's new address will be: Christ the King Seminary, Box 875, Manila, Philippine Islands.

Rochester Priest Aboard Super Carrier Earns Praise For Performing Varied Duties

Lieutenant Commander Joseph F. Cloonan, CMC, U.S. Navy, as "stant chaplain aboard the USS Ranger, CVA-61, third in the Forrestal-type series of super carriers, is a strong factor in the spiritual lives of the Ranger's officers and men," a news release from the Ranger said this week.

A priest of the Rochester Diocese, Father Cloonan, delivered the benediction at the commissioning of the Ranger. His work aboard the carrier since is commended in the release. "His warm smile and cheerful personality and his readiness to serve others combine perfectly to make him the right man for the job."

PRIMARILY his responsibility to the crew is one of a spiritual nature. His many other duties call for a "Jack of all trades," dependable energy and friendship and confidence of all who seek his help and advice.

Religious activities call for two Sunday Masses and morning Mass and Confession during the week days. He is "Father Cloonan" to Protestants and Catholics alike. He serves as advisor to the ship's newspaper, USS Ranger News, and is a member of the ship's Recreation Council. He is also a member of the Officer Candidate Board which selects qualified men to attend officer candidate training. He serves on the Habitability Board which is organized to enhance the living conditions and comfort of the crew.

Born and educated in Rochester, he is the son of Mrs. Catherine Cloonan, 9 East Jefferson Circle, Pittsford, and brother of the Rev. Paul J. Cloonan, assistant pastor of St. Philip Neri Church, Rochester.

CHAPLAIN CLOONAN received his elementary education at Immaculate Conception School and attended St. Andrew and St. Bernard's Seminaries. He was ordained in June, 1944.

LTDR Cloonan entered the Navy in August, 1948 with the rank of LTJG and was assigned to duty aboard the attack transport, USS Chilton, in the Pacific. The following year he was transferred to Adak in the Aleutian Islands, where he served until 1950 when assigned to the Naval Receiving Station, San Diego, Calif. In 1953 Chaplain Cloonan was attached to the First Marine Air Wing in Korea and was subsequently transferred to Baltimore, Md., where he served with the Naval Training Command.

Bishop Kearney Honored At AOH Initiation Rite

His Excellency Bishop Kearney presided at the initiation of the Ancient Order of Hibernians in the Bishop's honor, Nov. 10 at the Sheraton Hotel.

The 42 candidates, largest class in at least 25 years, brings the Monroe County membership to about 400 members according to the Rev. Michael P. O'Brien, chaplain.

"The Ancient Order of Hibernians does not need my presence or membership to bring it distinction," Bishop Kearney said after the ritual work. "It was held in high esteem long before tonight."

THE BISHOP, son of Irish-born parents, credited the order with keeping "alive the magnificent Irish culture, which played such a large part in Western civilization."

His Excellency traced its early origins more than a century ago when "it served to keep alive the faith" and offered Irish immigrants a place for "charity, fellowship and encouragement." County President Walter Anderson presided at the meeting.


The meeting was first of a series in the Buffalo diocese to promote active participation of the laity in liturgical worship.
