

'Our Lady Of The Bell' Society Formed In Hornell

Hornell—A new society, "Our Lady of the Bell," was organized by employees of the American Telephone Company here in Hornell.

At the initial meeting, Miss Mary Messina, chief operator of the traffic department, was elected president; Mrs. Jack Lisi, vice president; Miss Ruth McCorkrick, secretary and Mrs. Helen Phillips, treasurer.

The Rev. Joseph E. Smith, assistant pastor of St. Ann Church, is moderator.

There are presently more than 35 Hornell women employees of the telephone company in the organization. The group plans a Christmas party about the middle of December.

THE SOCIETY. "Our Lady of the Bell" was founded by the Rev. Frederick P. Gehring, C.M. in 1949 for the personnel of the Philadelphia Telephone Company. The original group in Philadelphia now numbers 1,800 women.

Aside from spiritual activities, such as an annual Communion breakfast, the society takes part

in some designated apostolic work. The Hornell chapter plans to contribute to the Pontifical Association of the Holy Childhood, whose head is Pope Pius XII. The Holy Childhood Association feeds, clothes and cares for orphan children throughout the world, regardless of race, creed or color.

Members of "Our Lady of the Bell" society are entitled to wear a special medal. It is in the shape of a telephone bell with an image of the Blessed Virgin, bordered in blue in the center of the medal. The medal was struck especially for the society by the Central Association of the Miraculous Medal.

Kodak High School Photo Contest Doubles Awards, Adds New Categories

Important changes in the Kodak High School Photo Contest for 1958 will present students with increased opportunities to achieve state and national recognition for themselves and their schools.

Under the new rules, contestants will compete only with students in their own grade level. Also, with the increased scope of the contest, the cash prizes have been more than doubled to \$10,400. In addition, judging of national award winners will be from state certificate winners.

EXTENDING APPROVAL to the contest, Rt. Rev. Msgr. F. G. Hochwalt, director of the National Catholic Welfare Conference's Department of Education, declared:

"As in the past 12 years, the Conference believes that the contest continues to afford an excellent medium for creative expression among young people. . . . In our opinion, all entrants in the contest benefit from the sense of achievement that is a natural outgrowth of the creative processes directly related to participation in this contest."

The Kodak High School Photo Contest is open to students in daily attendance (grades 9-12) at any public, private, or parochial high school in the United States and its territories. There is no limit to the number of black-and-white photographs an entrant may submit.
