**Diocese Represented  
At Confraternity Meet**

The Diocese of Rochester was represented at the Eighth Regional Congress in Albany by the Rt. Rev. Msgr. William Byrnes, Ithaca director; the diocesan director, Mission Helpers of the Sacred Heart from Ithaca and Fairport, and lay representatives.

The Ithaca group gave a Parish Executive Board Demonstration. Monsignor Byrnes presided. Also taking part were Mrs. Clare Smith, Jane Reed and Joseph Farley, all officers of the Ithaca group, and the following: Mesdames June Ahmann, Dorothy Wilsoza, Dantine Bella, Josephine Mellberg and Mathias Weiden and Thomas Riley.

MONSIGNOR BYRNES spoke of the extensive religious program conducted in his parish by the Mission Helpers of the Sacred Heart and lay catechists.

The Confraternity recently established in Fairport under the direction of the Rev. Leonard Kelly and Mission Helpers was reported fast becoming recognized as a parish organization necessary to meet the challenge of Religious Education today.

The Regional Congress was held under the patronage of the Cardinal Archbishops of the Province of New York at the invitation of Bishop William A. Scully of Albany. The attractive program listed members of the Episcopal Committee of the CCD in the U.S. and the Hierarchy of the New York Province.

His Excellency Bishop Kearney was on both lists and His Excellency, Auxiliary Bishop Casey was listed.

CONGRESS Headquarters were at the Albany De Witt Clinton Hotel; many of the sessions were held at the Cardinal McCloskey and High School. The theme of the Congress was "To spread and more fully establish the Kingdom of God in Individuals, in Families and in Society." Pius X.

General sessions were held for Priests, Religious and Laity, with further sessions for the Clergy, entitled The Priest and the CCD; for the Religious - with discussions entitled The Religious and the Religion Class; and for the Laity with discussions entitled Lay Participation in Instructional Programs.

At the concluding general session three topics were discussed: "Teaching Moral and Spiritual Values to Public School Students," "Teaching Religion in the Home" and "The Need of the Confraternity of Christine Doctrine."

Lay training courses were as follows: Parish Executive Board Members; Religious Discussion Club Leaders; Confraternity Lay Teachers; Fishers of Men; Confraternity Helpers; Parent Educators; and Apostolate of Good Will Workers.

A special High School Students session was also held and among the speakers on this program was the Rev. James Conroy, Columnist Youth Section, Our Sunday Visitor.

Blessed In Florida  
Parish Of Fr. Larkin**

Mt. Morris—A new provisional church for Christ the King parish in Jacksonville Fla. was recently dedicated and blessed by Archbishop Joseph F. Hurley of the Diocese of St. Augustine.

The Rev. W. Thomas Larkin, formerly of Mt. Morris, is the pastor of the new parish; that was established by him three years ago. The parish now has over 800 families with 600 students registered in the school, which also was started by Father Larkin.

Father Larkin is a graduate of St. Patrick's School, Mt. Morris where he was taught by the Sisters of St. Joseph. He is the son of Mrs. William T. Larkin, now of Jacksonville, and the late William T. Larkin of Mt. Morris.
