Families and friends of the deceased members are invited. Nomination and election of officers took place Nov. 12 with all officers reelected. An installation party and reception is planned for the January meeting.

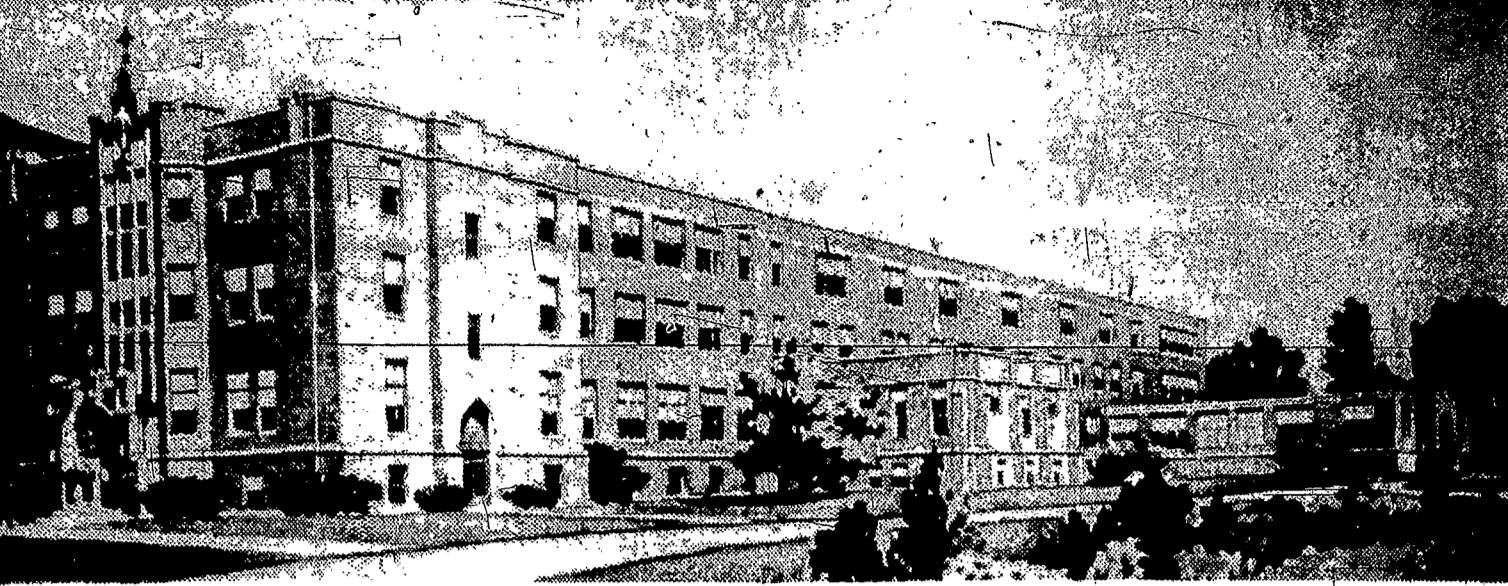

PROPOSED NEW SISTER TEACHERS' COLLEGE

Architect's rendering of the proposed new building for Catherine McAuley Junior College, a Sister-teacher college conducted by the Sisters of Mercy on Blossom Road. The three-story building, to be a west wing of the Motherhouse, will be started in spring and completed in 1959. It will house classrooms, dormitories, library and remedial teaching laboratory. The college now is conducted in a single basement room in the Mercy Motherhouse, and must erect a separate building by 1959 to receive a permanent charter from the state.

Bishop Kearney Opens McAuley College Campaign

Solicitation of special gifts toward construction of a new building for the Sisters of Mercy teacher-training college on Blossom Road was launched Tuesday at a committee dinner at which His Excellency Bishop Kearney was principal speaker.

Today's necessity to take steps toward alleviation of the teacher shortage was stressed at the dinner, held in the Mercy High School gymnasium and attended by nearly 100 members of the special gifts committee and more than 100 captains of the general committee.

Pointing out that the Sisters have given the diocese "100 years of labor and sacrifice," Bishop Kearney declared: "Their need today is a necessity, not a luxury—not merely a desire to be progressive. There is an obligation of gratitude on our part. Where are they to go except to their friends?"

THE SISTERS' APPEAL, the Bishop continued, "concerns God and the place of religion in the lives of thousands of young people. They are giving generously; we should do likewise."

Bishop Kearney expressed his thanks to the committee for aiding the Sisters. At the close of his talk he announced a contribution of \$10,250 from the estate of the late Mrs. Jeremiah G. Hickey. Nearly \$20,000 in other donations were announced at the beginning of the dinner, including \$3,000 from the Students Mission Crusade of Mercy High School.

Other speakers included the Rev. Richard T. Torrey, Sisters' chaplain, who termed the proposed new building "an investment in the future of your children and grandchildren"; Mother Mary Magdalene, mother general of the Sisters; Harold J. Coleman, general committee chairman, and Kearse, special gifts chairman.

SPECIAL GIFTS workers, headed by Frederick M. Tobin Sr., honorary chairman, and Henry J. Kearse, chairman, will call on friends of the Sisters of Mercy during the next two weeks, with report meetings slated Dec. 4 and Dec. 12. General solicitation here and in other parts of the diocese where the Sisters teach is scheduled in January.

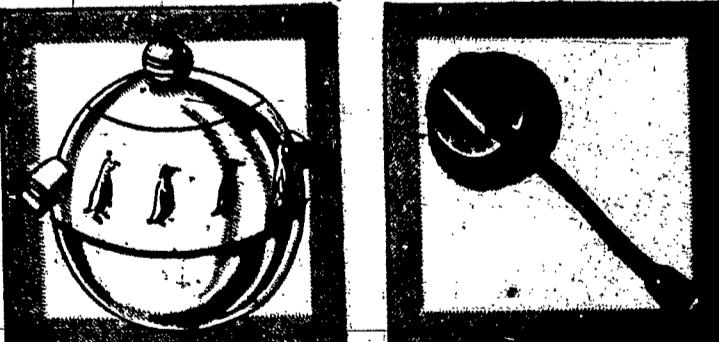
