The House of Hospitality is in its 16th year of personal charity. At the present time from 30 to 100 men are fed daily except Sunday at 5:30 p.m. Hundreds of articles are given out. More than 20,000 meals are served each year to men of all faiths and color.

ALL OF THIS is carried on with a \$5000 yearly budget, consisting of monies contributed by friends, plus donations of food from organizations and stores, the appeal said.
