Notre Dame, Ind.—(NCI)—The University of Notre Dame has been awarded a \$77,300 grant from the National Science Foundation to support its 1958 Summer Institute for High School Teachers of Mathematics, Dr. Arnold Ross, head of the university's mathematics department, announced.

Nearly 200 teachers are expected to enroll in the six-week summer institute program beginning June 19th. The foundation's grant will underwrite the tuition, subsistence, and dependents' depending on individual needs and requirements.
