Hartford Plans New Cathedral

Hartford, Conn.—(NC)—A new St. Joseph Cathedral will rise here on the Farmington Avenue site of the old one, which was destroyed by fire in December, 1956.

Archbishop Henry J. O'Brien of Hartford announced that preliminary plans submitted by Eggers and Higgins, architects of New York City, show the new cathedral will be of contemporary design.

The seating layout will provide five aisles with uninterrupted visibility from every seat in the nave. There will be room for 1,800 persons in the main church and an additional 1,600 in the lower church.

WROC-TV Schedules 'Rome Eternal'

Washington—(NC)—Camera men turned acrobats to film some of the art treasures of the Sistine Chapel and St. Peter's Basilica which will be featured on a nationally televised series on Rome.

The films, "Rome Eternal," will bring the grandeur of Rome and the Vatican to television for the first time. It will be shown on The Catholic Hour, WROC-TV Channel 5, on Jan. 5, 12, 19 and 26, at 1:30 p.m.

"Rome Eternal" was co-produced by the National Council of Catholic Men and the National Broadcasting Company. The script for the series was written by Pulitzer Prize-winner Paul Hogan.

Camera crews had to overcome a number of problems in shooting Vatican art treasures for the documentary series.

Michelangelo's sculpture "Moses" had to be filmed, in part, from a reclining position and his "Pietà" from a 20-foot scaffold in St. Peter's. His Sistine Chapel ceiling was shot from a crouching position, using a specially rigged camera angled upward.

Major problem confronting the producers of "Rome Eternal" was to capture the historical significance and beauty of Rome in only two hours of broadcast time. More than a year in the planning, the film was made in six weeks last summer.

Prelate Decries U. S. Lethargy

Boston, Mass.—(NC)—Deploring the concern about the dog in the Sputnik II, Archbishop Richard J. Cushing warned here that "the dumb animals to be pitted in this scientific age are we, the people."

The reason for pity is that "we think we can live in our usual carefree, prosperous way while the communists aspire to dominate the universe, with the subjection of the United States as an immediate objective toward that goal," he said. Urging measures to combat the communist threat, Archbishop Cushing said there should be better distribution of information on communism, particularly through careful teaching on the subject in schools. "I believe... that communism should be taught in our educational system. But it should be taught as an evil, taught therefore with a moral directive in the same way that treason is taught as an evil," he said.

Belgian Cardinal Sells School Bonds

Mallines, Belgium—(NC)—Arrangements for a loan of \$1,200,000 to Catholic schools in his archdiocese have been made by Cardinal van Roey, Archbishop of Mallines.

"The number of children whose parents wish to give them a Christian education grows every year," the Cardinal explained. "Of course, we accept them with joy and pride, but this increase forces us to undertake the extension of the buildings and the staffs of the schools."



TV To Show Vatican Excavations

Washington—(NC)—First films of the excavation of St. Peter's tomb get close inspection by Msgr. John J. Dougherty, S.S.D., production supervisor of the film series to be seen on the January Catholic Hour-TV series entitled "Rome, Eternal." Author Paul Hogan, winner of a Pulitzer Prize in 1954, has written the film commentary. Catholic Hour on television is produced by the National Council of Catholic Men, and the National Broadcasting Co.

Maryknoller Reports

Picture 'Bright' For Missions

Los Angeles—(NC)—The mission picture in Asia and Africa is generally bright, but there is a shortage of priests almost everywhere.

This was the report of Maryknoll Father John W. Comber, Superior General of the missionary society, as he stopped off here en route home from his first survey of Maryknoll's Asian and African missions.

After three months of travel, including an audience in Rome with Pope Pius XII, the Massachusetts-born missionary gave the following report of his observations:

AFRICA—Maryknoll has 18 parochial schools in Tanganyika, mostly in rural areas. The British give land and pay salaries to mission teachers.

PHILIPPINES—Maryknoll will open a new mission next March in Davao, Mindanao. The islands need more priests.

HONG KONG—"The Catholic population here has gone from 10,000 to 100,000 in the last five years. Last year there were 18,000 adult baptisms in Hong Kong.

"Maryknoll has formed four parishes from the refugee camps there. The Chinese have been drawn to the Church in great part by the charity of Catholic relief efforts.

"I was at supper in the Bishop's house," Father Comber recounted "and as soon as supper was over the room was cleared to accommodate a group that had come for catechism lessons."

FORMOSA—"There are now 450 missionaries on Formosa, in comparison to 23 in 1951, and there are great numbers of converts. The Chinese have not given up hope for liberating their country."

KOREA—"Koreans are trying to establish their nation after a major war, and at the same time continue to maintain its defense. North Korea is sealed off completely; no one is coming through.

"There is a great burst of education. A Catholic university will soon be opened in Seoul. The trend toward the Church is tremendous, but there is a great need of missionaries. Last year there were 1,400 adult baptisms in Pusan. In Seoul there are 18 Catholic parishes -- and 20 Protestant churches."

'Creator's Genius Humbles Obstetrician,' Says Expert

Washington—(NC)—"The obstetrician is humbled by the genius of the Creator," one of the world's best known obstetricians said here.

He is Dr. Grantly Dick-Read, 67-year-old English physician who is credited with perfecting a method known as natural childbirth.

"THE CREATOR did not intend that childbirth be a totally painful and frightening experience," Dr. Dick-Read, now retired, told an audience of more than 500 at Lisner Auditorium of George Washington University here. The physician is on a U. S. and Canada tour.

Dr. Dick-Read's method of natural childbirth, sometimes called "painless childbirth," aims at assisting women in childbirth to work with nature by overcoming fears and anxieties. It involves prenatal instruction and physical exercises, and, ideally, does not call for the use of anesthetics during birth.

THE PHYSICIAN, who is not a Catholic, was mentioned in a January, 1956, address in which the Pope gave moral approval to the new natural childbirth method.
