Priest 60 Years To Be Honored

The Rt. Rev. Msgr. Thomas F. Connors, pastor of Blessed-Sacrament Church will be honored by having the Fourth Degree Class of Knights of Columbus to be initiated on Sunday, May 4 named for him, according to Raymond L. Nary, master of the Fifth District.

Exemplification of the Fourth or Patriotic Section of the order will take place in Blessed Sacrament auditorium. The banquet will be held in the Sheraton Hotel.

THE HONOR is being conferred on Monsignor Connors to mark observance of his 60th anniversary of ordination to the Holy Priesthood in 1898.

The Fourth Degree was established by Supreme Officers in 1900 to offset the rapid spread of subversive elements in this country, Nary said. The degree's purpose is to instill in members a greater love of country and to permit them to pledge themselves to protection of God and Country against increasing growth of enemies.

Third Degree Knights of Co-

lumbus of one or more years are eligible for membership in the Fourth Degree, Nary announced.

Pontiff Endorses Game Conservation

Vatican City — (RNS) — Pope Plus XII praised members of the International Hunting Council for their work in protecting and conserving game animals throughout the world.

He told representatives of the council at an audience here that the effort to protect these animals was praiseworthy because "unfortunately, unrestrained and wild hunting has exterminated certain kinds of animals and birds whose disappearance is regrettable not only from the naturalists' point of view but also because it breaks the harmonious balance of nature."

The hunting council was founded at Paris in 1930. Besides working for the preservation of young animals and migratory birds it promotes certain standards for hunting and shooting.

Remedial Reading, Testing, Guidance Services Offered By Nuns' College

Limited registration for remedial reading classes conducted by the Sisters of Mercy, Blossom Road, will be accepted from 2 to 5 p.m. Sunday, Jan. 26. It was announced today. It is open to pupils of all faiths from second grade through college.

Also operated in conjunction with the Reading Laboratory is a Testing and Guidance Center, available to pupils of all ages who wish a clinical assessment of their abilities.

The center recently expanded its services to include vocational aptitude analysis for the local branch of the Vocational Rehabilitation Division of the State Department of Education.

BOTH THE reading laboratory and the guidance center are part of the services of Catherine McAuley Junior College, a teacher-training college conducted by the Mercy Sisters in the Blossom Road motherhouse.

Expansion of both the college and the reading and guidance clinics is scheduled this year through construction of a \$1,250,000 wing addition to the motherhouse.

Pledges toward erection of the proposed building will be sought from friends of the Sisters of Mercy throughout the diocese beginning Jan. 13.

AUXILIARY BISHOP Lawrence B. Casey will address more than 800 fund committeemen at a kickoff rally at 8 p.m. Monday, Jan. 13, in our Lady of Mercy High School Auditorium. Kickoff rallies for other solicitation committees are scheduled as follows: Elmira, Jan. 14; Corning, Jan. 15; Auburn, Jan. 17; Clyde, Jan. 21; Newark, Jan. 22; Hornell, Jan. 24.

Missionaries Going To Philippines.

Manila — (NC) — During the closing months of 1957 and the early part of next year a considerable number of new missionaries are scheduled to arrive in the Philippines.

Recently 10 new Columbian priests have come here and have been assigned to Luzon, Negros and Mindanao Islands.

Five American Franciscans have arrived to work in Negros and Leyte Islands. Two American Divine Word Fathers have also come. Soon after the new year nine Passionists will open a new district in Cotabato on Mindanao Island.

Early in 1958, about ten Maryknoll Fathers will begin work in Davao.

The Mill Hill Fathers and the Redemptorists, among others, have increased their personnel in the Islands during the past year.

New York Prelate Blesses New Ship

New York — (NC) — The newest ship of the Colombian merchant fleet was blessed here by Auxiliary Bishop James R. Griffitts of New York.

The blessing was preceded by the traditional harbor welcome of fog horn and whistle as the 7,880-ton motorship Manuel Mejia sailed past the Statue of Liberty to Pier 16, East River, where she was officially named in honor of one of Columbia's leading citizens.
