Jesuits Propose 'Across-Board' U. S. School Aid

Washington, (N.C.)—Presidents of the nation's 28 Catholic colleges and universities agreed here that if Federal aid to education is deemed necessary, "then that aid should be made available on an across-the-board basis, for all students and for all institutions."

The statement was released at the conclusion of the Jesuit annual meeting here at Georgetown University. The school had more than 149,000 in 28 departments, and reports almost one-third of the total enrollment in the country, more than 225 Catholic colleges and universities.

The statement was made at a press conference here by Father Paul C. Foy, president of St. Louis' Mary University. He said that the Jesuit proposal is a "first step" toward a more equitable distribution of Federal aid.

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IN REFERENCE to the proposal for a more equitable distribution of Federal aid to education, the following is a summary of the proposal:

"When because of state constitutional provisions, across-the-board distribution (to all students and institutions) is precluded, provision should be made for direct grants from the Federal government to individuals or institutions affected."

"Unless such provision is made, the program could not achieve its purpose, because it would bypass a very large pool of individual talent and of educational facilities."

Father Foy said that the direct grants would be distributed to all students and institutions, regardless of their religious affiliation. He said that the program would be a "first step" toward a more equitable distribution of Federal aid.

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Protestants Score Jesuit Proposal

Washington, D. C. — Protestant leaders here opposed a proposal by Jesuit college presidents that Federal aid to education be made available on an across-the-board basis, for all students and for all institutions.

The statement was released at the conclusion of the Protestant annual meeting here at Georgetown University. The school had more than 149,000 in 28 departments, and reports almost one-third of the total enrollment in the country, more than 225 Catholic colleges and universities.

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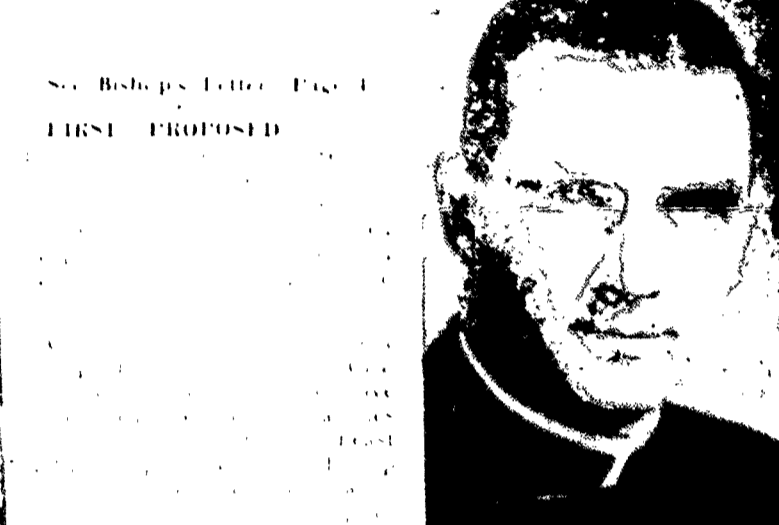

Laymen Increase Retreat Attendance

Growing popularity of the spiritual retreat movement among Catholic men of the Rochester Diocese is evidenced in the report that, during the past year, 3,409 of them attended the Notre Dame Retreat House.

This record attendance for retreats was announced Tuesday evening as members of the Laymen's Retreat League launched their 1953 program at evening Masses celebrated in three parishes of the Rochester Diocese.
