

Foreign Student Speaks At First Ithaca Breakfast

Ithaca—Wolfgang Englander of Santiago, Chile, South America was guest speaker at the First Saturday Breakfast which was started in Ithaca this month. He is attending Cornell University as a graduate student.

He spoke of devotion to Mary in his native country, Chile. He told of the Virgin of Carmel, the patron of Chile, how she became their patron and of the shrine now being built in that country honoring her.

ONE OF THE devotions which he related is called the Month of Maria which starts Nov. 7, and ends on the feast of the Immaculate Conception, Dec. 8.

He told how every evening they have services in Church during this month which is a time of special prayer and repentance. As the month progresses attendance at this service increases considerably.

He also mentioned shrines and points of interest about Catholics and priests in his country. He stated that about 95% of the population is Catholic. Regarding priests, it is customary for them to be always seen wearing their cassocks and that their mode of traveling is done usually on foot or bicycle.

ABOUT 33 attended this breakfast which was held in Parish Hall. Mrs. Richard Taber arranged a shrine honoring Our Lady of Fatima. Mrs. Paul Scott and Mrs. John Churey were chairmen.

The next breakfast will be held on Saturday, Feb. 1, following the 8 a.m. Mass in Parish Hall. All parishioners are invited.

American Funds Aid New Norway Church

Lillestrom—(NC) A new church, built largely through the contributions of American Catholics, was blessed here by Bishop Jacob Mangers of Oslo.

In 1956 Bishop Mangers made a tour through the United States, giving sermons and lectures on the state of the Church in Norway, where only about 5,000 people out of a total population of 3,400,000 are Catholics.

It was through the response of American Catholics to the Bishop's plea that the construction of the new church was possible.

Revenue Service Offers Assistance To Taxpayers

The Internal Revenue Service during the 1958 income tax filing season will again stress self-help as its basic theme of taxpayer assistance, District Director E. C. Coyle, Jr. has announced.

"The self-help program," he said, "means that taxpayers complete as much of their returns as possible before asking help from us. Most taxpayers can do the whole job after a careful reading of the form itself and its accompanying instruction booklet."

"WE ARE STILL going to provide help to those who actually need it," said Director Coyle, "and we shall stress our telephone assistance program, which will enable taxpayers with problems to call us up for a quick answer designed to enable them to complete preparation of their returns."

"Office assistance" he said, "will be available where required but will naturally entail considerably more of the taxpayer's time."

"The most important thing to the taxpayer in preparing a return or in seeking telephone or office assistance," the Director explained, "is to have all of his 1957 financial records in hand and to have all the necessary facts in mind."

Nagahama, Japan—(NC)—The Japanese make a ceremony of drinking tea and apparently have an endless appetite for it.

One Maryknoll missionary here, Father J. Gregory Gilmartin, of Waterbury, Conn., decided to capitalize on this fact.

He felt that some way had to be found to overcome the natural bashfulness and reticence of the Japanese converts to the Church who attended his mission. Too often, he thought, the new Catholics would come to attend Mass, and leave immediately without getting to know one another and so become closely united in the Church.

Now Father Gilmartin has a special room at the mission where the people can sit and chat after Mass and services, drinking tea.

The idea is working out quite well, Father Gilmartin reports.

Brazilian Reds Infiltrate Catholics

Rio de Janeiro, Brazil—(NC)—Communists have succeeded in infiltrating even Catholic organizations in their drive to subvert non-Red groups in this country.

This warning was made here by Cardinal de Barros Camara, Archbishop of Rio de Janeiro.

In a radio address the Cardinal blamed the apathy of the country's political leaders for the Red successes.

"We do not deserve God's protection against communism because we have done nothing to avoid the evil," the Cardinal stated.

Cardinal de Barros Camara spoke as Brazilian authorities reported that the nation's Communist party is being reorganized in an effort to step up its activities, despite the fact that it has been outlawed since 1947.

Requiem Mass Offered For Superior General

Requiem Mass for the repose of the soul of Reverend Mother Marie-Therese de Lescure, superior general of the Society of the Sacred Heart was celebrated by His Excellency Bishop Kearney in the Academy of the Sacred Heart, 8 Prince St., Rochester, Jan. 2.

Reverend Mother de Lescure, 73, died in Rome on Dec. 31, 1957 after an illness of several months. Superior General of the Society since 1946, she visited the United States in 1953 and South America in 1954.

A Requiem Mass at which Academy of the Sacred Heart students attended was offered this morning, Jan. 10. Solemn Requiem Mass in the Convent Chapel was offered by Monsignor Wilfred T. Craugh, rector of St. Bernard Seminary, Saturday, Jan. 4, in the convent chapel.

Monsignor Craugh was assisted by the Rev. John J. Crowell, C.S.S.R. as deacon and the Rev. Robert White, S.J. as subdeacon. THE SOCIETY over which Reverend Mother de Lescure presided, was founded in 1800 by St. Madeleine Sophie Barat in France. The society now has 6,813 Religious in 182 houses on all five continents carrying on the work of the education of girls. In the United States there are 926 religious in 31 houses including seven colleges.

Reverend Mother de Lescure, who was the first French Superior General since St. Madeleine Sophie, was born in 1884 and entered the Society in 1904. At the time many of the French houses had been closed because of the laws against religious teaching communities and Mother de Lescure therefore spent 11 years in Italy and Belgium.

SHE RETURNED to Poltairs in France after the houses had been reopened and was head mistress of the school in the convent, which had been founded by St. Madeleine Sophie and had been the first novitiate of the society.

In 1926 she became superior of this house and 10 years later superior vicar over a group of French houses, a position she held until her election as superior general in 1946.

Since then she has resided in Rome where, during the past year, she was honored by the French Government with the Cross of the Legion of Honor. It was while Reverend Mother de Lescure was superior at Poltairs that Sister Josefa Menendez, whose cause of canonization has been introduced, was a co-adjutrix religious of that house.
